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7. Summary Description:

The Franklin Historic District Expansion includes two properties located directly northwest of the current historic district boundary. The expansion includes the three-acre Camp Family Homestead historically associated with the Camp family since George Camp, Jr. acquired it in 1826. All of the founding members of the Camp Manufacturing Company, now part of the International Paper Corporation, grew up on this property before forming the company in 1887. The Camp family is still closely connected to the Homestead and the city of Franklin. The other property included in the expansion is the thirteen-acre Poplar Springs Cemetery, which has been the primary final resting place for citizens of Franklin since 1883, including Camp family members.

The primary dwelling was moved to this site on the Camp Family Homestead in the early 1930s to replace an earlier home, which had burned in 1931. The current dwelling originally stood in southwestern Isle of Wight County and was known as the Thomas R. Jenkins House. Following its reconstruction on the Camp property, the Jenkins House served as the Camp Dairy Farm manager's home for almost two decades. Standing two-stories, this wood-frame building has a side hall and parlor main block with a one and a half-story gable roof side addition and a rear ell addition. The main block and rear ell are clad in beaded weatherboard. The side addition has squared weatherboards. The main block is entered from a small porch protected by a pediment decorated with dentil blocks and supported by square columns. The cornice is decorated with close-set modillions on the main house. The side addition incorporates six over six double-hung sash windows on the first floor and inset gable dormers on the upper half-story. The entire building was constructed on brick piers, which have since been filled with continuous footings. The exterior retains a large amount of original material and the original floor plan has been retained. A majority of the interior, however, was replaced during the home's reconstruction in the 1930s including the floors, mantels and baseboards. The walls are all covered with wooden paneling planed by the Camp Manufacturing Corporation. It was also during the reconstruction of the home that the two additions were built. All of the founding members of the Camp Manufacturing Company now part of International Paper Corporation grew up on this property before forming the company in 1887. This group of sawmills quickly turned into a wood product manufacturing company with a planning machine and later a paper mill. The company eventually became the largest employer in the region. The Homestead property is still closely associated with the Camp Family.

Primary Resource Information: **Cemetery**

Poplar Springs Cemetery has been the primary final resting place of the citizens of Franklin since 1883. The cemetery is a relatively flat parcel of land divided into three sections by High Street and Beamon Street. The ornamentation of the cemetery is simple consisting mainly of stone grave markers. The graves are laid out in rows with some family groupings enclosed by stone borders. The markers are commonly low and rectangular or slightly arched with the occasional taller monolithic stones marking more prominent graves, such as the Camp family. The property has several wooded sections interspersed with little formal landscaping throughout.

The oldest section of burials is located to the northeast of High Street. There is a Girl Scout cabin located within the boundary of the cemetery. It is a simple wood frame, gable roof structure that was built ca. 1960. This non-contributing resource is not historically associated with the cemetery.

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8. Statement of Significance

The Franklin Historic District Expansion incorporates two properties significant to the history of the City of Franklin into the existing Historic District. These properties represent both the historic Homestead of the family whose business established the economic base of the city and the primary final resting place for this family as well as most of Franklin's other residents.

The Camp Family Homestead was the seat of the Camp family for over one hundred years. In 1887, six of the Camp family brothers living at the homestead formed the Camp Manufacturing Company. Beginning as a conglomerate of sawmills, this company quickly added a planing mill to produce flooring and had added pulp and paper mills by the end of the 1930s. The economic growth of Franklin is synonymous with the Camp Manufacturing Company, known as the Union Camp Corporation for many years after 1956. This name change in 1956 when the company merged with the Union Bag Company reflects the significance of the first business merger in the history of Camp Manufacturing. "Although its extensive paper-manufacturing operations are located just across the narrow Blackwater [River] in Isle of Wight County, Union Camp's plant dominates the eastern skyline of Franklin, where most of its labor force lives."¹ Now, part of the International Paper Corporation the Camp family's paper and sawmills continue to be one of the largest employers in the region. The Camp Family Homestead continues to be closely associated with the Camp family. In addition to the employment opportunities afforded to city residents because of this large corporation, the Camp family's generous philanthropy is seen in area institutions such as P.D. Camp Community College.

Poplar Springs Cemetery has been the final resting place for the citizens of Franklin since 1883. Serving as the primary cemetery for the city, many significant individuals are buried there including three of the Camp brothers and more than 62 Confederate States of America Veterans. One of these veterans was Richard C. Barrett, a telegraph operator who once owned all of the land occupied by the City of Franklin from 2nd Avenue to South Street. Much of this property is already included in the Franklin Historic District. Other prominent citizens buried here include the first mayor of Franklin, James F. Bryant, R.A. Pretlow, who owned the first peanut business and S.W. Rawls, Sr., who was a distributor for Gulf Oil.

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Verbal Boundary Description

The proposed historic district boundary expansion would increase the district by sixteen acres to include the Camp Family Homestead at 221 Homestead Road and the Poplar Springs Cemetery. Please see the Franklin Historic District National Register of Historic Places Inventory Nomination Form continuation sheet number 36 for a verbal description of the current historic district boundary. Touching the northeastern edge of the current boundary at High Street, the proposed southern boundary line will run west from High Street along the southeastern edge of the cemetery and the Norfolk and Western Railway to the edge of and including the future cemetery expansion property just east of the Church of Jesus Christ and Latter Day Saints. The boundary then runs north along the rear of the church property to the southeastern corner of the Camp Family Homestead. From here it moves northwest to Homestead Road and then curves east along Homestead Road to include the Camp Family Homestead before turning southeast at the northeastern edge of the Camp property. The boundary then runs from the southeast corner of the Camp property along the rear of the properties on Homestead Road turning south to run along the rear of the properties on High Street. It then turns east to run along the southern edge of the property at 901 N. High Street and continues across High Street until coming to the City of Franklin/Southampton County line. From there the boundary moves southeast to the drive leading to the WYSP Radio Tower. It then runs southwest along this drive to the Norfolk and Western Railway. From here the boundary moves northwest along the railway to the starting point at High Street.

Boundary Justification

The Franklin Historic District Boundary has been expanded to include the Camp Family Homestead at 221 Homestead Road, which is still closely associated with the Camp Family. It has also been expanded to include Poplar Springs Cemetery, which has been the primary cemetery for the City of Franklin since 1883. The cemetery sits just to the northwest of the current district and is directly between the district and the Camp Family Homestead.
