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Page: 1 Maps Introduction

Dr. Joseph W.A. Whitehorne and Dr. Clarence R. Geier prepared the Auburn battle maps for this nomination. The maps encompass the core and study areas of the two Auburn battles on October 13 and 14, 1863.

The maps represent interpretations made from field visits, discussions with local land owners, programs of reconnaissance survey and metal detecting, archaeology, and a comprehensive review of primary and secondary sources.

Dr. Whitehorne and Dr. Geier focused their investigation on a series of historic structures; the Auburn Church at the intersection of Rogues Road (Route 602) and the Warrenton Road (modern Dumfries Road / Route 605) on the north; the Saint Stephen's Church near the intersection of the Saint Stephen's Church Road (modern Old Dumfries Road / Route 667) and the Bastable Mill Road (Route 603) on the east; Murray's (Melrose) Castle on Three-Mile Switch Road (modern Rogues Road and Route 602) on the south; and Double Poplars Baptist Church on the Double Poplars Road (modern Old Auburn Road/Route 670) on the west.

Map 2. Engagement of Union III Corps with Lomax's Confederate forces about 4 PM on October 13, 1863.

Map 3. Auburn locale from 6 PM October 13 to dawn on October 14, 1863 showing disposition of Union II Corps and Confederate forces.

Map 4. Deployment of Union II Corps and Confederate forces at dawn on October 14, 1863.

Map 5. Stuart's attack on Union II Corps and retreat between 6 and 8 AM on October 14, 1863.


Map 6. Union II Corps withdraws through Auburn October 14, 1863.

Map 7. Union II Corps screening forces withdraw as Rodes pursues between 8 and 9 AM October 14, 1863.

Maps 8, 9, and 10 illustrate the evolution of the ABPP's baseline Auburn Battle I and Battle II core and study perimeters into the final nominated boundary of the Auburn Battlefield District. The designated boundary determination followed intensive research, analysis of the topography, evaluation of the historic integrity, and concurrence of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources.


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Page: 2 Map 1. Disposition of Union III Corps & Confederate forces in Auburn area prior to 4 PM on October 13, 1863.




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Page: 3 Map 2. Engagement of Union III Corp with Brigadier General Lomax's Confederate forces about 4 PM on October 13, 1863.






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Page: 5 Map 4. Deployment of Union II Corps and Confederate forces at dawn 14<sup>th</sup> of October 1863.




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Page: 6 Map 5. Stuart's attack on Union II Corps and retreat between 6 AM and 8 AM on October 14, 1863.




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Page: 7 Map 6. The Union II Corps withdraws through Auburn on October 14, 1863.



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




