DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The site of the eighteenth-century town of Newcastle is [REDACTED]

The town was laid out in a grid plan with three north-south streets, called (from west to east) Main, Second, and Water Streets. Water Street may either have been below the bluff beside the river, as was a street of the same name at Yorktown, or on elevated ground as at Port Royal, Virginia. The north-south streets were crossed at right angles by two streets called "Road to river" and one, at the northern end, "Road to bridge". These latter three streets probably descended to riverside warehouses via gullies now existing at the verge of the field. A 1751 map shows fifty-two numbered half-acre lots and six lots used for warehouses.

Eighteenth-century records indicate the existence of stores and wealthy persons' houses in Newcastle. A 1745 act was intended to affect some of the town's less wealthy residents, for it forbade the building of wooden chimneys and ordered that all existing wooden chimneys be taken down by the following year. The act further made it unlawful for owners to allow their swine to run at large in the town and permitted the holding of two annual fairs there.

No early buildings remain standing at Newcastle, but surface artifact indications and random testing indicate extensive archaeological remains. There are no roads through the site, and as it has been utilized only for agriculture and woodland since the town's demise, below-ground remains are largely undisturbed.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Newcastle was the scene of one of Virginia's expressions of rebellion preceding the American Revolution, and its site now holds potential for learning about such colonial river-port towns.

Town lots were laid off in March 1739 on a forty-acre site owned by William Meriwether. The survey was done by John Henry, father of Patrick Henry. In May, 1740, the Assembly empowered county justices to have a bridge built [redacted] from Newcastle. Development as a small commercial center occurred because of the town's location [redacted]

In August, 1746, Nicholas Water's Newcastle house was the scene of an elaborate celebration of the defeat of Bonnie Prince Charlie's forces at the Battle of Culloden. The Virginia Gazette reported that "a long Arbor was set up, in which fifty Gentlemen and ladies dined, and several other Tables were full, in the House . . . A large Quantity of Punch was given to the Populace and at each health there was a Volley of small Arms Discharged, and three cheerful Huzzas at each Volley. A large bonfire was made in the evening, and the windows of the Loyalists in Town were illuminated."

The town's major political event occurred on May 2, 1775, when Patrick Henry called the Hanover volunteers to meet at Newcastle in order to protest Governor Dunmore's removal of the colony's gunpowder. The armed group marched toward Williamsburg, but they met the Governor's representatives at Doncastle's Ordinary and there peacefully accepted payment for the powder.

Considerable military activity took place around Newcastle in 1781. In an entry in his journal the following February, Baron Ludwig von Clozen, aide-de-camp to Rochambeau, wrote of Newcastle's location "on a charming plain . . . [redacted]. We lunched at the home of a very wealthy person, Colonel Syme."

Both historical records and surface artifactual evidence indicate that intensive occupation did not last far into the nineteenth century. Silting [redacted] and change in agricultural marketing systems led to the town's demise. The early date of abandonment makes Newcastle especially valuable for archaeological study. Like Hanover Town upriver, Newcastle provides the opportunity to investigate a pre-Revolutionary American port town undisturbed by later development.
