DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Fort Bowman is a two-story rectangular structure built of limestone, and topped by a gable roof. The arches over the opening are dressed to size, and none of the mortar joints exceeds one inch in thickness. The original interior woodwork is intact. The undersides of the floorboards are dressed and form the ceiling finish of the story below. The original paneling between the center hall and the rooms consists of vertical planks dressed on both sides, and beaded at the joints. The interior beams and joists are smoothed to a high polish but do not appear to have been painted or varnished. A later kitchen wing and a handsome iron and wood portico are the only apparent alterations.

Behind the house are several early structures, including a well cover, and a dairy or smoke house.

An Indian site in the lowgrounds below the house has been tested by the Archaeological Society of Virginia and the Virginia State Library.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Include Personages, Dates, Events, Etc.)

Architecturally, Fort Bowman is an important example of the Pennsylvania German influence in the Shenandoah Valley. It was built about 1753 by George Bowman who migrated with his wife, Mary, from Pennsylvania to the Shenandoah Valley in 1731-32. Mary Bowman was the daughter of Jost Hite, another prominent settler in the Valley.

The sons of George Bowman played important roles in the colonial and Revolutionary history of America. Abraham was a colonel of the 8th Virginia Regiment (following Muhlenberg in the Revolution), and Captain Isaac Bowman, with his brother, Joseph, aided George Rogers Clark in the conquest of the Northwest in 1778-79.

Among those buried in the Bowman graveyard behind the house are Captain Isaac Bowman and his wives, and Samuel Kercheval, historian of the Valley, and three of his daughters.

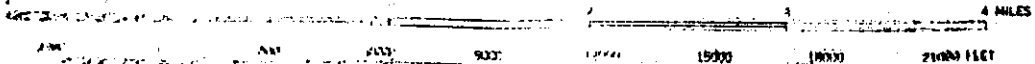
