DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Old Rectory was built as a T-shaped frame dwelling with exterior-end chimneys of irregularly bonded brick. The foundations and partition walls, except for later additions, are laid in a similar bonded brick. Service additions in the southeast jog of the house were made in the twentieth century. In the earlier part of this century, there were service additions set next to the south chimney, but these have now been removed. At that time, a porch chamber, approximately 20' by 20', was centered on the second floor of the entrance facade. It was supported by wooden pillars set on brick piers. A porch deck, supported by similar piers, surrounded a major part of the house. The present owner removed the porch chamber and cut its roofing back about 10' to form a one-bay, two-story portico supported by four fluted Doric columns. The portico pediment is ornamented with dentils and has a semi-circular window. On the entrance facade, the cornice of the house has a similar modern dentil cornice. The original portions of the house are sheathed with early beaded siding. Windows are 9-over-9 on the first floor and 9-over-6 on the second. Shutters held back by S-shaped catches now frame most of the windows. 4-light attic ventilation windows flank the flues of the two end chimneys of the house. The gable roofs are now covered with seamed tin painted black.

Inside, the living room, sitting room and front hall have flat paneled wainscoting while the dining room, upstairs central bedroom, and hall have a plaster dado. The first floor rooms also have shallow dentil cornices. The living room mantelpiece has a thin strapwork band, gouged pilasters, a frieze with lateral trusses and a central, raised panel, and a reeded cornice. In the sitting room, next to the fireplace a chimney-pent forms a press which has double, two-panel doors. The mantel in this room has a molded surround (which includes a rope molding), reeded pilasters supporting a frieze with trusses and a central panel, and a dentil cornice also decorated with rope molding. The entrance hall has a simple rail stairway with straight balusters, leading to the second story with two flights broken by a landing. The newel post, as well as the landing posts, is unmolded and capped by a ball finial.

The fireplace in the upstairs north bedroom has been closed. In the south and central bedrooms, the mantelpieces have molded surrounds surmounted by friezes with flanking and blocks under mantel shelves. The end blocks of the central bedroom mantel are fluted. The upstairs rooms have thin, molded cornices.

Doors throughout the house are six-paneled with the long sides of the four lower panels running longitudinally while the long sides of the two small upper panels run transversely. The door architraves are molded. Above the entrance doorway, there is a four-light transom with the narrow panes set transversely.

At the rear of the house stands the old log kitchen which has been weather-boarded and has had a frame section added to it.

Old Rectory is part of a 25-acre tract which adjoins several other parcels of land also held by Mrs. C. W. White. The house is set in fine, rolling

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The original portion of Old Rectory is a typical example of the handsomely proportioned frame farmhouses built in Bedford County in the late eighteenth century, and is an integral part of the St. Stephen's Road rural neighborhood. The interior woodwork is finely executed and is almost completely intact.

The house was erected around 1787 for Waddy Cobb who also had nearby Elk Hill built about ten years later. From around 1828 to 1904 the house served as the rectory of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. The following succession of Saint Stephen's rectors (with the dates of their arrival given) is believed to have resided at Old Rectory: Nicholas Hamner Cobb, 1828; I. S. Marbury, 1839; Q. A. Kinsolving, 1844; R. H. Wilmer, 1852; W. H. Pendleton, 1855; George A. Gibbens, 1870; Albert Ware, 1876; Edmund W. Hubord 1881; T. W. Jones, 1896; F. L. Lemosy, 1897; R. R. Claiborne, 1903; E. B. Meredith 1904.

Saint Stephen's was temporarily closed in 1904 and Old Rectory passed into private hands. It was first owned by the Caskie family and later went to an in-law, Jim Owen Watts. The house was acquired by the Clarence Whites in 1928.

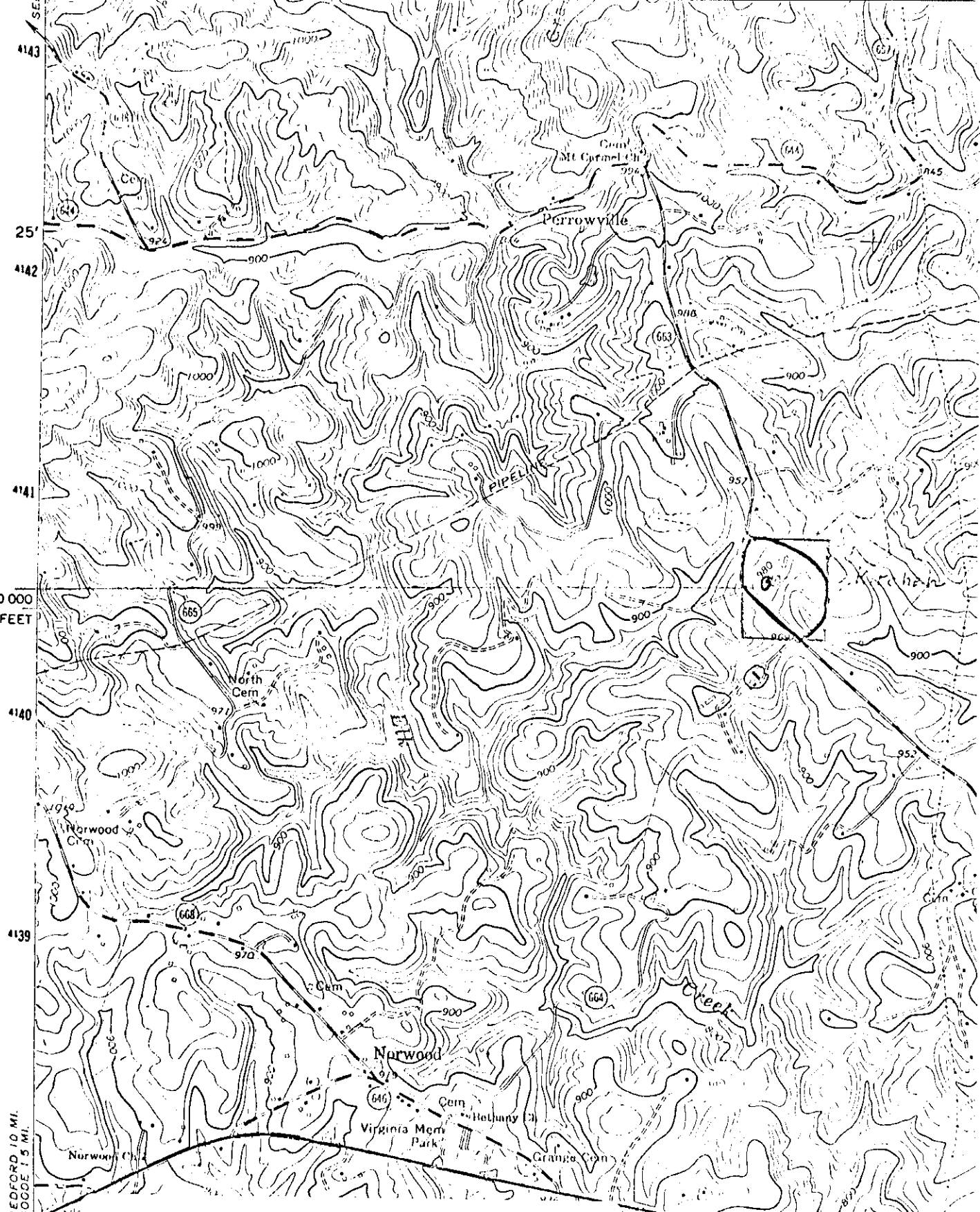

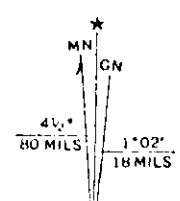
