DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (II known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Gloucester County Court House Square contains an assemblage of period structures ranging from the mid-eighteenth through the mid-twentieth centuries. The district consists of the Gloucester County government buildings located on a parcel of land surrounded by Main Street (U. S. Route 17) and those structures bordering the square, housing private businesses, offices and residences.

The two most important structures, both architecturally and historically, in the district are the courthouse and the Botetourt Hotel (now the Botetourt Administration Building). Other structures include the Martin Hicks, Attorneys, Building; the RTO Building; the Daniels, Turnbull and Freeman, Certified Public Accountants, Building; the Ralph K. Vanlandingham and Company, Certified Public Accountants, Building; the Catesby G. Jones, Attorney, Building; the John M. Folkes, Attorney, Building; the Jones House; Gardiner's Shoe Repair; the Botetourt Lodge; the State Farm Insurance Building; the Reserve Life Insurance Company Building; the GloucesterVeterinary Hospital; W. C. Tucker's Department Store Building; S and S Hobbies; and the Kearn's Real Estate storage house.

The Courthouse is a high-styled colonial structure with Flemish bond brick construction. An excellent example of its style and form, the Courthouse is the focal point for the square. The one-story structure has a T-shaped plan, and a Colonial Revival portico addition. The building's extreme dimensions measure approximately 48'by 68'. The three-sectioned facade consists of two symmetrical wings on either side of the projecting tetrastyled Ionic portico which shelters the main entrance. sunburst fanlight is set in the portico's pediment. entrance consists of a double door with a square grid, arched fanlight above the architrave. The main body of the building is covered by a hipped roof and has an interior brick chimney The wings have two bays each stack at either end of each wing. with the windows containing six-over-six sash and a sunburst fanlight between the architrave and the cornice. Similar windows are found in the rear section; those on the south end A beveled brick water-table surrounds the entire The rear section of the building has an exterior structure. chimney stack which is a later addition. The Courthouse has been renovated several times, is kept in good condition and is still used for its original purpose. Little but the walls, roof framing and possibly the modillioned cornice are original however.

The other colonial structure within the boundary of the district is the Botetourt Hotel (originally John New's Ordinary, now the Botetourt Administration Building). Constructed in the mid-eighteenth century, the impressive two story structure has unusually fine detailing for a structure of its type. The building is large, rectangular in shape and of Flemish bond

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Gloucester County Court House Square survives as a classic example of an early Virginia county seat complex. The walled courtyard with its cluster of governmental buildings, and its surrounding offices and commercial structures comprise one of the most picturesque groupings of its type in the Commonwealth.

The square is dominated by the brick T-shaped colonial courthouse which, though having undergone several alterations, follows the general pattern of eighteenth century courthouse architecture. With its careful proportioning, fine brickwork, and round-arched windows, the building is one of the most architecturally sophisticated of Virginia's important collection of colonial courthouses. The traditional construction date of the courthouse is circa 1766, although this date has not been definitely established. Documentary evidence recently to light suggests that portions of the present structure could be earlier.

The courthouse is the only colonial structure within the square. The other governmental buildings, including the jail, the clerk's office, the treasurer's office, and sheriff's office, all have construction dates spanning the period from the early nineteenth century to the mid twentieth century. These buildings may stand on or near the sites of their colonial counterparts, however.

The prodigious Botetourt Hotel building, located just to the south of the square, was built circa 1770, and was known originally as John New's Ordinary. A notable example of colonial architecture, the two-story structure is one of the largest as well as one of the few brick taverns surviving from the pre-revolutionary era. It recently has been restored and adapted to county offices.

Besides the tavern, a number of law offices were among the necessary appurtenances of any early county seat. The series of small law offices, mostly of nineteenth and twentieth century origin, facing onto the square complete the picture of this venerable complex.

brick construction. The first floor front is sheltered by a hexastyled Tuscan porch which was installed in a recent restoration and is thought to follow the lines of an early porch. Facing the building from Main Street and beginning at the left end, entrances are placed in the first, second, fourth and fifth bays. Six-over-six sash are used on the second floor and nine-over-six sash on the first floor. The steep gable has two wide interior end chimneys and is shingled with slate. The cornice on the front and rear facades has large modillions. The rear facade has a full English basement with six-over-six sash and a beveled brick water-table. The basement is entered through the rear.

The Botetourt Hotel was restored in 1968 for use as Gloucester County offices and as a cultural center. The interior had been greatly altered, but remaining period details have been preserved in a suitable manner. A basement kitchen has been adapted into public meeting space. All the fireplaces are in working order. The rear area of the building has been appropriately landscaped.

The other structures in the county government complex within the square and those surrounding the square serve a variety of purposes, ranging from the Sheriff's Office, inside the square, to the various lawyer's offices, accountant's offices, and commercial stores and residences which surround the area. These structures are constructed of various materials including brick, (plain and covered with stucco), and weatherboarding. Their relatively harmonious scale, ranging from one to two stories in height, gives the district an architectural unity which has become increasingly rare today in areas surrounding county courthouses. Although the Courthouse and the Botetourt Hotel are the two main architectural landmarks of the district, all of the structures within its confines of the historic district are important for contributing to its overall effect.
