#### IV. Site:

(Number all entries)

- A. General setting: Belmont is at the end of a long lane that today stretches through cornfields, but that was originally lined by magnificent oaks. The house is located on high ground to catch the cooling breezes, and faces south.
- B. Outbuildings: Several nineteenth century outbuildings remain near the house. Southeast of the house is a small single-bay, gable roof, weather-boarded structure, covered with shingles, that was the smokehouse. Southwest is a weatherboarded, gable roof building, two-bays long, and one-bay wide with the entrance in the gable end. The structure has sawn barge boards and served as the office. The brick chimney of the old kitchen remains north of the smokehouse.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

At Belmont, on the morning of 23 August, 1831, the Nat Turner slave revolt was effectively suppressed. The revolt had begun late Sunday evening at the Travis place (now destroyed), about fifteen miles southwest of Belmont, when Nat Turner and seven lieutenants met, feasted, planned the revolt, and began their journey of murder and pillage at the home of Joseph Travis, step-father of Putnam Moore, Nat Turner's owner. At its height the revolt probably included about eighty slaves and free men of color. About daybreak on August 23, Nat Turner and a reduced force of about twenty men, advanced on Belmont, home of Dr. Samuel Blunt. Apparently Nat Turner thought Belmont was deserted, but in fact, Blunt, his son, and several other men were in the house, and the Blunt slaves, electing to assist in the defense of the place, were gathered in the kitchen just east of the house. At this encounter several of Nat Turner's men were killed, and others including his chief lieutenant, Hark, were captured. Nat Turner and a few followers escaped, but were pursued and most were killed or captured by the militia near Captain Harris'. Nat Turner himself escaped and remained in hiding until he was apprehended on 30 October. After a hearing at a court of Oyer and Terminer, Nat Turner was executed by hanging on November 11.

The Nat Turner slave revolt sent shock waves throughout the South where it was widely interpreted as being part of a Region-wide insurrection. It has remained a significant event in the legends and traditions of the Nation, and recently has been the subject of a widely-acclaimed, if sometimes criticized, novel. Turner apparently believed himself to be divinely selected to lead his people out of bondage. He and his closest confederates hoped to attain a freedom, that may have been as much psychological as physical. Others were lured into the revolt by the prospect of plunder or other transient enjoyments.

The revolt was short but violent; between 55 and 65 whites were killed by the Negroes and about 70 insurrectionists killed, executed, or transported. It should be noted, that this was the only revolt after 1739 from which mass killings resulted and the last organized effort by slaves to revolt in the American South. In addition to the widespread, if largely unfounded, fear of a general conspiracy, the Turner revolt contributed to the creation in law of a more restrictive regimen for slaves and free Negroes alike. It is a fact the the Virginia General Amenbly, having seriously debated the question of abolition in its session of 1831, moved away from this position in the session immediately following the insurrection in Southampton County. The Revolt was probably not decisive in the loss of momentum for voluntary emancipation however. The cause was lost, as was invariably the case before 1865, on the twin obstacles of compensation for the owners and the additional

expense for transporting the formerly servile population out of the country. Compensation with transportation was beyond the fiscal means of the Commonwealth.

Belmont is also a good example of a modest late eighteenth century Southside plantation house. A distinctive feature is the Chinese lattice railing
on the second story. The house was built for Googge Carey, probably in the
fourth quarter of the eighteenth century. The Blunt family acquired the
property in the early nineteenth century. In 1822 Dr. Samuel Blunt obtained
Belmont from Richard Blunt, and was living at Belmont during the Revolt.
Tradition states that his son, 15 year old Simon Frazier Blunt fired the
first shot at the insurgents from an upper window. Young Blunt is said to
have been rewarded for his bravery by an immediate commission in the U. S.
Army from President Andrew Jackson.

Ann Ridley acquired the property in the 1830's and willed it to Thomas Ridley. Norfleet Ridley became the owner in 1873, and sold Belmont to R. S. Pope in 1879. Pope sold the property to E. L. Marks in 1894 and Belmont remains in the Marks family. Today it is owned by Paul Camp Marks, while Mrs. Frank Marks retains a life interest in the house.

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
