SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

The Park View Historic District encompasses the majority of the Park View neighborhood located in the northeastern area of the city of Portsmouth. The city's first residential suburb north of the downtown commercial center, the Park View community was developed during the last decade of the 19th century and continued to grow during the first decades of the 20th century. Laid out in a typical gridiron pattern, the tree-lined streets of Park View are bordered by an impressive array of vernacular and high style frame and brick residences that represent the architectural achievements of builders and craftsmen of the late Victorian and Progressive eras in Portsmouth. Such architectural styles as the Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, American Foursquare, and Bungalow contribute to the picturesque quality of the streetscapes in the district. Containing 310 structures, the Park View Historic District possesses only fifteen buildings that are considered noncontributing.

ARCHITECTURAL ANALYSIS

The main geographic orientation of Park View is expressed in the community's gridiron pattern of streets. The principal north-south extending avenues are lined by the majority of structures within the district. These avenues include from east to west: Parkview, Hatton, Riverview, Linden, Webster, and Elm avenues. The shorter secondary streets extend east to west and intersect the main avenues at right angles. They include from north to south: Bay Street, Spratley Street, Naval Avenue, Leckie Street, Crawford Parkway, and Ann Street.

Situated a short distance north of the city's downtown commercial area, the southern section of Park View was the first area of the community to be developed in the 1890s. Hatton Street possesses some of the oldest and most architecturally distinguished residences in the district. The Cleaton House at 200 Hatton Street, for example, may have been constructed as early as 1890. This ornate frame house is the most opulent example of the Queen Anne style in Park View. Its wraparound porch is a masterpiece of Victorian craftsmanship with its cutout pattern balustrade, slender turned posts, and delicate spindle frieze which features drop finials and radiating spindles. An unusual tripartite circular window is framed by a similar circular opening in one of the porch bays. The projecting bays and gables of the house is embellished with decorative sawnwork and the house's asymmetrical composition is emphasized by a northeast corner octagonal turret. Also built during the 1890s, the Trant House at 253 Hatton Street is another fine Queen Anne-style house with a distinctive square tower capped by a combination mansard/hipped roof and pedimented dormers. Large scroll brackets support a front pediment above a two-story semihexagonal bay with a corresponding frame porch. Similarly, the Codd House at 231 Hatton Street is another large frame house that also displays characteristic features of the Queen Anne style such as a corner octagonal turret, an asymmetrical facade, and an irregular roof line. The front entrance is sheltered by a handsome Colonial Revival pedimented portico with paired Doric columns that support a decoratively carved frieze.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

During the late 19th and early 20th centuries the City of Portsmouth experienced tremendous commercial and industrial growth, necessitating the construction of new housing to accommodate the city's growing work force. With the introduction of electric streetcars, mass-produced building materials, and building and loan associations, it became possible for developers to offer affordable housing in the outlying areas of the city. The new "streetcar suburbs" especially appealed to blue-collar and white-collar workers seeking a more wholesome living environment for their families. Laid out in a typical gridiron plan between 1888 and 1892 as a direct consequence of the extension of the first trolley line to the northeast suburbs of the city, Park View took its name from the nearby U.S. Naval Hospital park, then the only public amenity of its kind in the Portsmouth-Norfolk area. The majority of houses in the residential district date to the two decades following Portsmouth's annexation of the area in 1894 and represent a full range of the eclectic architecture of the period. Among the district's 310 structures are outstanding examples of the Queen Anne, Colonial Revival, American Foursquare, and Bungalow styles.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The development of Park View as Portsmouth's earliest streetcar suburb is closely related to the city's emergence by the early 20th century as one of Virginia's major shipping, industrial, and population centers. The eastern terminus and headquarters of the Seaboard Line, Portsmouth with its sister city of Norfolk provided in this period a base of operations for seven steamship companies and nine railroad trunk lines that carried the Commonwealth's growing abundance of peanuts, fertilizer, coal, lumber, tobacco, fresh farm produce, and cattle for export coastwise and abroad. Then as later, the city's major industrial efforts centered on the Norfolk Naval Shipyard. During the eras of Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson, which saw the advent of modern steel ships, the launching of America's "Great White Fleet," and the accelerated naval construction of World War I, civilian employment at the shipyard in Portsmouth increased from 700 in 1888 to 11,234 in 1919. A dramatic increase in the number of Portsmouth's inhabitants was both a cause and a consequence of the city's commercial and industrial growth in these years. The population climbed from 12,000 in 1886 to 33,190 in 1910, making Portsmouth the third largest city in Virginia even before World War I, when its population rose to 57,000.¹

Prior to this phase change in the economic and social life of the city at the end of the 19th century, the area known today as Park View lay outside the city in rural Norfolk County, and consisted of several large tracts of farm land. The western sector, bounded by Scott's Creek to the west, the Elizabeth River to the north, and the present line of London Boulevard to the south, belonged to Thomas Owens. The eastern sector, flanked to the east by the U.S. Naval Hospital and known as "Alabama," belonged to the Hatton family. Following the extension of Portsmouth's first trolley



7. DESCRIPTION -- Architectural Analysis

The majority of houses built in Park View during the 1890s are simple frame houses, typically consisting of two-and-one-half stories, clad in weatherboard, and often presenting a gable end to the street. Decorative sawnwork usually adorns the apex of the front gable, while a three- or four-bay porch with turned posts and sawn brackets extends across the front. Houses located at 51 Riverview Avenue, 938 Ann Street, 934 Ann Street, 1016 Crawford Parkway, 1051 Crawford Parkway, 117 Linden Avenue, 109 Linden Avenue, and 66 Parkview Avenue are typical houses of the period in Park View.

Double houses were a new phenomenon in suburban housing in Portsmouth during the 1890s. Usually a long frame building with a symmetrical facade and two separate central entrances, the double house often features a central front gable which visually attempts to tie the separate residential units together. Such a double house is seen at 81-83 Linden Avenue. It is a six-bay frame house with a central front gable, two symmetrically positioned entrances, and a long frame porch with bracketed eaves and turned posts extending across the facade. Another double house at 254 Hatton Street features pedimented two-story bay windows flanking a central double-story porch.

By the turn of the century, the community was rapidly expanding especially in the area north of Leckie Street. Houses combining elements of the Queen Anne style, the Shingle style, and the pervasive Colonial Revival style were common in all areas of the neighborhood. Older houses scattered among the various blocks were soon flanked by rows of two-story frame residences that were usually topped by hipped roofs with front gables positioned above second-story bay windows. Sawnwork and brackets often decorated the gables and pediments of the earlier houses; however, Colonial Revival elements such as bracketed modillion or dentil cornices, Palladian attic windows, pedimented dormers, and porches with Tuscan columns and a turned balustrade became increasingly more popular in the early 20th century. In fact, the majority of houses in the district appear to date from the turn of the century and the first decade of the 20th century and their architectural designs reflect the influence of the Colonial Revival on the more traditional vernacular architecture of the era. For example, the house at 100 Riverview Avenue retains the basic proportions, mass, and decorative details of the Queen Anne style; however, a Palladian window is seen in the front gable and a full pediment is positioned above the entrance bay of the porch. Another example of this melding of styles is seen in the house at 1048 Crawford Parkway. Again, the basic mass of the house is Victorian while a Colonial Revival bracketed modillion cornice extends across the front of the building and is echoed in the porch frieze. The porch is supported by classical Tuscan columns and features a turned balustrade and a dentil frieze.

Some of the best Colonial Revival compositions in the district are temple front buildings with projecting double-story porticoes. The house at 205 Hatton Street is an excellent example of this design type. It is a two-story frame house with a full pedimented, double-story, tetrastyle portico supported by fluted Ionic columns. A bracketed modillion cornice with dentils and a plain frieze completely surrounds the building while molded window cornices top 16/1 sash double-hung windows.

Two churches in the district, Park View Methodist and Park View Baptist, are imposing brick structures, each with a hipped roof, a full entablature surrounding the building, round-arched stained-glass windows, a pedimented front entrance, and a giant order Doric portico with a full pediment.

Gambrel-roofed Colonial Revival residences are less commonly seen in the district; however, two good examples are located at 1023 Naval Avenue and 162 Webster Avenue. The gable ends of both structures face the street and are outlined in raking cornices and dentil friezes. Each house also has a Tuscan- or Ionic-columned porch embellished with a classical frieze and cornice.

Park View architecture at the turn of the century, to a large degree, was the product of regional master carpenters and builders who possessed an extensive knowledge of current architectural styles and craftsmanship. They expressed individuality and pride in their work to the extent that few residences in the neighborhood are identical. The building wave that swept Park View early in the 20th century produced hundreds of houses, each with its own surprisingly individual character. Unlike any other residences in the district, the houses at 142-144 Linden Avenue and 1035 Naval Avenue, for example, are particularly good expressions of individuality in architectural craftsmanship. The house on Linden Avenue has round-arched windows reminiscent of the Italianate style and a Colonial Revival porch and cornice. The house on Naval Avenue features an incongruous mansard roof, characteristic of the Second Empire style, capping an otherwise sophisticated Colonial Revival frame house.

By the 1910s and 1920s much of Park View was already developed, so that most houses built during this period were constructed as in fill between the older houses. Consequently, they are sporadically located throughout the district and tend to be variations of Bungalow and American Foursquare designs. Rows of three or more such houses are more commonly found in the first blocks of Parkview, Riverview, Linden, Webster, and Elm avenues. These blocks are located near the river and were among the last to be developed.

Three of the best examples of the American Foursquare house in the district include the houses at 917 and 1040 Leckie Street and 223 Elm Avenue. These buildings are basically square two-and-one-half-story frame structures, some clad in shingles on the second floor, but otherwise covered in weatherboard, and have a hipped roof, a single hip-roofed dormer, an asymmetrical facade, and the ubiquitous three-bay porch usually supported by tapered square wood columns on brick piers. The house at 917 Leckie Street features some references to the Colonial Revival in its design; however, the majority of American Foursquare houses in Park View are void of classical details.

A number of Bungalow houses are also found in the district. Typically a one-and-one-half-story frame or brick house with a sweeping gable roof and wide overhanging eaves with exposed rafter ends, the bungalow in Park View usually features a shed-roofed dormer above a porch that extends across the facade. Two especially well preserved examples are located at 118 Parkview Avenue and 158 Hatton Street. The latter house is the only example of stone architecture in the district.

Brick houses are rarely found in Park View; however, existing ones tend to be bungalows built in the 1920s. An unusual brick dwelling is located at 1020 Leckie Street. Now owned by Portsmouth General Hospital and used as part of its school of nursing, this large, originally single-family, residence dates from the late 1920s or 1930s. It has a clipped gable roof and dormers, projecting bays, 9/1 sash double-hung windows, and an arched hood over the front entrance. Other houses from the same period include Dutch Colonial frame or brick houses and small apartment buildings.

line to the U.S. Naval Hospital in 1888, the Hattons sold a square parcel of land, corresponding to the area formed by Hatton, B (now Blair), Webster, and North streets, to Portsmouth Commissioner of Revenue V. Butt and his partner C.S. Sherwood, a prominent Portsmouth jeweler. The successful subdivision of this first tract into town lots by Butt and Sherwood encouraged the Hattons and Owens to act in their own right as land developers. Between 1888 and 1892 three additional tracts--one bounded by A (now Crawford Parkway), Hatton, B, and Webster streets; one between Naval, Hospital (Ft. Lane), North, and Hatton; and one defined by Naval, Webster, B, and Cooke (now Elm)--were carved from the Hatton and Owens tracts and sold by lot. What remained of the original farm tracts was purchased and subdivided by three land companies in 1892. The Park View Company developed the area between Harrell, Cooke, Naval, and Owens. The Portsmouth Land Improvement and Promotion Company purchased land between Bay, Park (now Parkview), Naval, and Linden. A third firm, the Park Avenue Terrace Company, established by Thomas Owens, developed the parcel between Leckie, Cooke, Ann, and Owens. By 1892 all of Park View had been laid out in its present grid pattern of blocks with streets averaging 60 feet in width and lots averaging 29 feet in width by 105 feet in length. First called "Park Avenue" and later "Park View," the new residential community enjoyed the only public amenity of its kind then to be found in either Portsmouth or Norfolk, the seventy-five-acre park of carefully landscaped groves, drives and promenades surrounding the 1830 naval hospital building.

While more than fifty dwellings were erected in Park View during the early settlement period of the neighborhood, between 1888 and 1892, the majority of its₃ houses date to the two decades following Portsmouth's annexation of the area in 1894. With annexation came improved public transportation, city water, public schools and other municipal services that greatly appealed to homebuyers and tenants and stimulated its growth. The construction of the Methodist church in 1900 and the United Church of Christ building in 1909 likewise improved the reputation of the neighborhood as a desirable place to live and raise a family.

The character of Park View and its residents at the beginning of the second decade of the 20th century can be gleaned from a random sample of fifty-seven households recorded in the 1910 U.S. Census.⁴ The average household consisted of five members.

8. SIGNIFICANCE -- Historical Background

No household had less than two nor more than eight members. Thirteen of the fifty-seven households consisted of extended families, with three generations of the same represented under one roof. Five households took in boarders but only four employed domestic servants. Twenty-four of the fifty-seven households lived in houses which they rented rather than owned. No resident in any of the households was black. Of the residents who listed occupations, twelve were employed on the railroad, two worked for steamship companies, ten were laborers at the Navy Yard, and fifteen listed the trade of mechanic or laborer without reference to an employer. Twenty residents were employed in retail sales and commerce, and ten as public servants, either as school teachers or postal clerks. Fifteen identified themselves as clerks or office workers. Two residents among the fifty-seven households in the sample worked in lumber mills.

Although the character of Park View as a neighborhood and as a built environment was largely determined by World War I, a substantial building campaign did take place in the 1920s. The majority of these later dwellings were American Foursquares, erected either on the periphery of the neighborhood or as in-fill among existing structures. During this period the Baptist church building was also constructed. Since the Great Depression little new construction has been undertaken, the number of owner-occupied houses has decreased, and the historic fabric of the neighborhood has greatly deteriorated from lack of maintenance. More recently, however, these trends of decline have begun to be reversed. Changes to the historic fabric of Park View are now reviewed by a local architectural review board.



Boundary Justification: The Park View Historic District contains nearly the entire Park View neighborhood with district boundaries reflecting, to a great extent, the original boundaries of the late 19th-century suburb. The grounds of the U.S. Naval Hospital and the Elizabeth River are located N of the district, providing a convenient northern boundary for the district at the termination of Parkview, Riverview, Linden, Webster, and Elm avenues. The extensive grounds of the U.S. Naval Hospital are also located E of the district as well as the modern Portsmouth General Hospital and the Portsmouth Psychiatric Center. Parkview Ave., a section of Hatton St., and part of Fort Lane divide the district from this modern complex. Nearly all the historic structures along the N sides of the 1000 and 1100 blocks of Blair St. were replaced by contemporary ranch-style houses; therefore, the area was excluded from the district. Similarly, most of the residential area W of Elm Ave. and including the 100 block of Elm Ave. is almost exclusively devoted to modern ranch-style architecture that is inappropriate for inclusion in the Park View Historic District. The area containing vacant lots and scattered houses E of Scott's Creek and W of the first block of Elm Ave. was excluded from the district.
