SUMMARY DESCRIPTION

The Newtown Historic District in Staunton, Virginia, is located to the west and northwest of the city's downtown Beverley and Wharf Mistoric districts. It includes the campus of Stuart Hall School, the historic block of Trinity Episcopal Church, and the magnificent grounds of Thornrose Cemetery. This medium-density area is almost entirely residential in use and has a strong and cohesive sense of neighborhood. Although there are several large and imposing homes built by the very wealthy, most of the houses were erected as the more modest dwellings of Staunton's prosperous middle class and the city's many working people. The original twenty-five acres known as the "Newtown Addition" and comprising the southern one-third of the district were deeded to the city in 1787, only forty years after Staunton was founded. It is in this portion of the district where most of the late 18th- and early 19th-century structures, as well as the larger and more elegant residences, are located. The rest of the district is composed of homes built between 1870 and 1920 during Staunton's boom years to house the city's rapidly growing population. Despite the steep hills that characterize the area, most of the streets conform to the grid pattern laid out in 1787. With few exceptions, the blocks in between consist of neat rows of detached houses on city lots of all sizes. The individual yards account for most of the landscaping, as there are few "street trees" in this district. The overall building fabric is good, although there are derelict structures as well as those that are meticulously maintained. Architectural styles in Newtown range from Jeffersonian Neo-Classical and Greek Revival to bungalows of the 1920s. The Newtown Historic District not only mirrors the city's growth patterns but also contains many properties of outstanding architectural and historical interest.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Newtown Historic District in Staunton, Virginia, is located directly to the west and northwest of the city's historic downtown core¹. It encompasses approximately 161 acres² and includes the campus of Stuart Hall School, historic Trinity Episcopal Church, and the magnificent grounds of Thornrose Cemetery.

A small portion of the district, from Lewis to Church streets, was added to Staunton's original 1747 town plan in 1748-49 (see Map #1). On November 6, 1787, Alexander St. Clair deeded to the growing village twenty-five acres of his land "...which was ordered to be laid off in lots and streets,...(t)his is that portion of Staunton commonly called New Town..."3 (see Map #2). Most of the remaining land in this district was added in the large annexation of 1860, with only the westernmost part of Beverley Street added in the annexation of 1905 (see Map #3).

In the original Newtown plat, the streets and lots were laid out in a symmetrical grid running almost exactly north-south and east-west; today, this grid remains virtually unchanged. As development spread further out from the city's center, the grid pattern was retained and the streets extended north up Reservoir Hill. West Beverley Street, once known as the Parkersburg Pike, also follows its original path as it continues west toward the Allegheny Mountains. All the streets are now asphalt-paved, but in some areas, the old limestone curbs and the brick sidewalks remain.

Topographically, the district is hilly in nature, with the highest elevation being at the north end of Jefferson Street, where the town's reservoir was once located. Open land

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is minimal, and the area is largely characterized by neat rows of detached residences along each street. Except for the grounds of Stuart Hall School and Thornrose Cemetery, open space is limited to the yards of individual houses, which range in size from small city lots to an entire block. However, there are several lots of vacant land in the southernmost part of the district and some private parking areas where houses have been demolished.

Current land use is almost entirely residential, except along Lewis and Beverley streets. where the zoning allows for commercial establishments. This appears to have been the case a century ago, as there are still several 19th-century commercial structures along Beverley. This is a medium-density area, with the majority of structures originally built as single-family, detached dwellings. The larger and older homes tend to be located along the streets of the Newtown Addition proper. As a general rule, the further one gets from the old downtown core, the more recently built the structures are. This building pattern reflects the growth trends of the city as a whole. Despite the fact that the area's development spans well over a century, the district has a strong sense of neighborhood unity and visual continuity.

This cohesiveness is due to a number of factors including uniformity of height, scale, use and lot size, and the lack of modern "intrusions." The Newtown Historic District contains some 450 buildings of which the vast majority are two-story, detached, frame or brick buildings of similar scale, built on small, city lots. Although many have been converted into apartments, the exteriors are largely unchanged and still appear as single-family residences. Only about a dozen structures were originally built as town Houses or as multi-family units, and these are randomly scattered throughout the district. There are twenty commercial buildings, mostly along West Beverley Street. The older commercial houses or buildings are compatible with their neighbors as they are usually three stories in height with living quarters on the upper floors. There are few structures which actually detract from the historic character of the district. For the most part, they are located in the recently developed areas around Reservoir Hill Park or along the commercial corridor of Beverley Street.

Predominant materials are frame with variety sidings such as beaded or German, and brick. A number of structures were covered with stucco in the 1930s and '40s; others have been covered with asbestos shingles or aluminum siding which detracts from their original appearance. Fortunately, however, this is the exception, and most of the buildings retain their original exterior materials.

Although there are a few late 18th-century and mid-20th-century structures, most date from 1870 to 1920 when Staunton's population increased rapidly as a result of the railroad and the agricultural and industrial revolutions. The district includes significant individual examples of Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, Neo-Classical, Eastlake, Queen Anne, and Colonial Revival styles, but the bulk of the buildings display Italianate characteristics or are vernacular houses of the builder/speculator variety. Condition of the buildings ranges from excellent to deteriorated, with most structures in good condition.

Several properties of outstanding historical or architectural merit are located in Newtown Historic District, three of which are already listed in the National Register.

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These are: The Stuart House at 120 Church Street (Jeffersonian Neo-Classical, 1791, wing added 1844); "Old Main" of Stuart Hall School (Greek Revival, 1846); Trinity Episcopal Church (Gothic Revival, 1855 with later alterations), Rectory (Jacobethan Revival, 1872), and Parish House (Gothic Revival, 1872-3, rear wing 1924).

In addition to these highly significant properties, there are other noteworthy buildings in this district: Stuart Hall's Cochran House (Italianate, 1858) and Robertson House (Eastlake, 1886), both on West Frederick Street; the Smith Thompson House at 701-703 West Beverley Street (Vernacular, ca. 1792); the George M. Cochran House at 606 West Johnson Street (Greek Revival with Colonial Revival alterations, 1851 and ca. 1915); 18 Church Street (Eastlake, ca. 1880); and several fine brick residences designed by the local architectural firm of T. J. Collins & Son which are located throughout the district.

The Thornrose Cemetery on the west edge of the district was laid out in 1849-50 on 12 acres. This magnificent cemetery has since grown to over 65 acres. The main entrance on West Beverley Street is a gate lodge flanked by stone walls that terminate at two footgates at each corner of the grounds. The three entrances, all executed in rough-cut stone in the Romanesque Revival style, were designed by local architect T. J. Collins ca. 1896 as part of a major beautification plan for the cemetery. Over the years, Thornrose has been embellished with the addition of marble statuary, a special section with a monument to the Confederate dead, a stone bridge and tower, and numerous fine stone vaults. The bridge and some of the vaults are also the work of architect Collins. The entire cemetery is beautifully landscaped with flowering shrubs and trees and is meticulously maintained, creating a park-like atmosphere for the surrounding neighborhood.

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The following is a listing of all the properties located within the Newtown Historic District. All are dwellings (or were originally dwellings) unless otherwise indicated. The streets are listed in alphabetical order. The district includes approximately 450 structures, 30 of which are marked with asterisks (*) as being noncontributing because they do not conform to the rest of the district in style, scale, INVENTORY or materials. (see Continuation Sheet #119)

BALDWIN STREET - Not named on early maps, this street was called "Elk Street" for a short while, but the name was changed to "Baldwin" Ca. 1895.

North side:

211: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; single story porch across front with simple brackets and pendants. Vernacular co 1900 Feb. with simple brackets and pendants. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance in east bay. 6/6 1 lights on second story openings. Interior chimney. 1-story, 2-bay concrete block garage to east of dwelling.

215: Stucco (over original frame); 2 stories; "L"-hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch Lacross east half of front. Originally Italianate, but recently remodeled with halftimbering, stucco and "permastone." Ca. 1875. Entrance in east bay. 6/6 lights. Remodeling has destroyed original character of house.

South side:

No properties face this side of Baldwin Street.

WEST BEVERLEY STREET - Beverley Street was one of the original streets laid out in the earliest plat of Staunton (1747), when it was called "Cross Street." On a 1749 plat, the name was changed to Beverley Street after Sir William Beverley who, in 1736, received the land grant known as "Beverley's Manor" in which Staunton is located. As the town grew, Beverley Street was extended both to the east and west. Although there are structures along this section of West Beverley Street that date as far back as Ca. 1790, the majority of them were built between 1870 and 1910. At the turn of the past century, the trolley ran along Beverley as far west as Thornrose Cemetery.

North side:



Lot P/7 (portion) (map 375): Parking for Methodist Church. Formerly site of 213-215 W. Beverley Street.



217-219: (Stonewall Jackson Primary School): stucco (over original brick); 2½ stories; complex gable roof with four gabled roof dormers; 4 bays; no porch, but has hoods with consoles over entrances in both end bays. Tudor Revival. Original building dates from Ca. 1885, remodeled in 1913. Two entrances, one in each end bay, with 6-light double doors topped by transoms and flanked by 4/4 side windows. Entrance bays have quadruple windows with 4/4 lights and transoms on 2nd story. Gable ends in attic stories of entrance bays are half-timbered with small paired window openings with 6/6 lights. The two

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main central bays have quadruple windows with 8/8 lights on both 1st and 2nd stories and gabled dormers with 8/8 lights in attic story. Original label molding remains on side walls and interior retains original tongue and groove wainscoting, floors, and staircases. Remodeled in 1913 by local architect T. J. Collins. This building was Staunton's first permanent public school building for white children. In 1912, President-elect Woodrow Wilson spoke from the front steps of this building when he addressed the homeeoming crowd.

Lot P/11 (map 375): Vacant. Formerly site of 227-229 W. Beverley Street.

301-303: Brick; 2½ stories; shed roof; 4 bays (duplex of 2 bays each); single story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. 2 entrances in central bays with transoms. Small attic openings. 1/1 lights.

305: Brick; 2 stories; complex gable and hip roof with conical roof over projecting turret bay; 3 bays; single story porch across front with turned balusters with Tuscan columns. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1885. Entrance with transom in central bay. Segmental brick arches with label moldings over openings. Bracketed cornice. 2/2 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. 3 sided turret bay added Ca. 1900.

309: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch across front with sawn millwork balustrade. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Two entrances in central bay. 2/2 lights. 2 interior corbelled chimney.

*401-407: Brick; 2 stories; flat roof; 9 bays on 2nd story; 3 storefronts on 1st story.

Vernacular. Mid 20th C. Commercial structure. Three storefronts, each with own entrance and additional entry to upper story in center of building. Simple corbelled cornices on 1st and 2nd stories. 6/6 lights on 2nd story. Does not contribute to district.

*409-411: Brick; 2 stories; flat roof; 3 bays. Vernacular. Mid 20th C. Commercial structure. 2-bay storefront and 1-bay entrance to upper story. Simple corbelled cornices. Paired 6/6 lights on 2nd story. Does not contribute to historic district.

μ^γ Lot 0/8 (map 375): Parking Lot.

501: Brick; 2 stories; complex hip and gable roof; 3 bays; single story porch across front and side with corner pediment and Tuscan columns. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1905. Entrance in central bay. Classical cornice with dentils repeated on porch and gable ends. Segmental arched openings with sawn millwork lintels. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.

507: Concrete "stone" blocks; 2½ stories with 3-story corner turret; complex slate hip roof with hipped dormer and conical roof on turret; 3 bays; single story porch across front and side with Tuscan columns. Chateausque characteristics. Ca. 1905. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Cornices with dentils under eaves. 1/1 lights. Early example of concrete "stone" block construction.

Lot M/13 (map 375): Vacant. Formerly 601 W. Beverley Street.

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605: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof with small gable off-center; 2 bays; single story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. Entrance in east bay. Small gable on left decorated with stick-style elements. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.

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607: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; single story porch across front with brackets and criss-cross railing. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. Entrance in east bay. 2/2 lights.

609: Board and batten; 1 story; gable roof; 3 bays; single story porch across front. Vernacular. Pre-1870. Entrance in central bay. 6/6 lights. Exterior chimney. Possibly very old log dwelling.

701-703 (Smith Thompson House): Brick (#703) and frame (clapboards - #701); 1/2 stories; gable roof with gabled dormers; 6 bays (double house, 3 bays each); 1-story porch across front under roof. Vernacular. Ca. 1792 (#703) with #701 added Ca. 1830(?). Entrances in central bays in each section. 2/2 lights in #703; 6/6 lights in #701. Fine brickwork in chimneys. Brick portion (#703) built by Smith Thompson, a Scot who fought in the American Revolution and was a barber by trade.

Lot M/18 (map 375): Parking for 709-711.

709-711: Brick; 3 stories; stepped roof; 3 bays; no porch. Italianate. Ca. 1875. Commercial structure. 2-bay storefront with entrance to upper stories in east bay. Heavy brackets in cornice. Segmental arches with sawn millwork lintels over openings. 2/2 lights.

801: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story front porch with sawn millwork M balustrade and square piers. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1870. Entrance with transom and sidelights in west bay. Bracketed cornice. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney.

803: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch across front with sawn millwork balustrade and square piece. The light of the same piece. Entrance with transom and sidelights in east bay. Bracketed cornice. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney. Similar to #801 and appears to have been built later to "match" #801.

807: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch across front with brackets and sawn millwork balustrade. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1880. Entrance with transom in east bay. Architrave trim around openings. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney.

811: Frame (aluminum siding added in 1980); 2 stories; hip roof with projecting central gable and bay; 3 bays; single story porch across front with brackets. Italianate characteristics. Pre-1870. Entrance with transom in central bay. Bracketed cornice. First floor windows are full length. 6/6 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

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815: Brick; 2 stories; complex gable and hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch across 2 east bays with millwork balustrade , pendants and brackets. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1875. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Elaborate paired cornice brackets. Fishscale shingles in gable ends. 2/2 lights. 1 interior chimney.

821: Brick (Flemish bond); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch across 10 front with fluted Tuscan columns. Greek Revival, Ca. 1850. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Architrave trim around openings. Second story central opening has sidelights and a balcony. 6/6 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

827: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; single story porch around front and side otag with turned posts and balusters and sawn millwork brackets. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Entrance in west bay with transom and sidelights. 2/2 lights. Interior chimney. Elaborately decorated porch was added Ca. 1900.

2 833: Stucco; 2 stories; "L"-gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story gabled entrance porch with balusters in central bay. Vernacular. Ca. 1860. Entrance with transom in central bay. 4/4 lights. Exterior endwall chimney.

837: Frame (beaded siding); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; single story porch with \mathcal{N}^{2} sawn millwork balustrade and brackets across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Bracketed cornice. Paired windows. 1/1 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

901: Brick; 2½ stories; complex "L"-gable roof with dormer; 5 bays; 1-story porch with turned posts and balusters and ornate sawn millwork across three east bays and around part of east side. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1875. Entrance in central bay has double doors with transom. Gable ends decorated with fishscale shingles and ornate millwork pendants and bargeboards. Segmental arched openings. 1/1 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

907: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; single story porch with Tuscan columns and dentils across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. 2/2 lights. 2 interior corbelled chimneys.

913-915: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays on 2nd floor and storefront and entrance to upstairs on 1st floor; no porch. Vernacular commercial structure, Pre-1899. 6/6 lights.

y 917-919: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 3 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; no porch. Vernacular. Commercial structure. Pre 1899. Entrance to 2nd floor in east bay, storefront with central entrance in west bay. 2/2 lights.

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921: (Allen Chapel - African Methodist Episcopal Church): Stucco (over original frame); 2½ stories; gable roof with twin side towers; 3 bays; no porch. Vernacular. Ca. 1865 and remodeled in 1924. Entrance in central bay. Battlemented twin towers. Gothic tracery in round-arched and pointed arched windows. Reportedly, the oldest Black congregation in Staunton, organized 1865. Remodeled by T. J. Collins & Son, Architects.

927: Stucco (over original frame); 2½ stories; complex hip and gable roof with dormer and projecting gable; 2 bays; 1-story porch with Tuscan columns across front and around side. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1905. Entrance with transom in west bay. Finials on gable and dormer. 1/1 lights. 2 interior chimneys. Much original detailing lost in remodeling.

931: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch with turned posts across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1895. Entrance in west bay. 4/4 lights. 1 interior chimney.

933: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch with turned posts across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1895. Entrance with transom in east bay. 2/2 lights.

935-937: Frame (German siding); 3 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; no porch. Vernacular. Ca. 1895. Entrances in both bays. 2/2 lights.

939: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; gable roof with gable facing front; 2 bays; 1-story porch with turned posts and millwork brackets across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1895. Entrance in east bay. Decorative shingles in gable end. 2/2 lights.

للا Lot 0/6 (map 374): Vacant. Part of #939 property.

 λ Lots 0/23 and 0/25 (map 374): Vacant.

945-947: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; shed roof; 4 bays; 1-story porch across middle two bays. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrances in middle bays. Scalloped bargeboard under front eave. 2/2 lights.

951: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch with turned balusters across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1860. Entrance with transom in central bay. Paired windows in central bay of 2nd floor. 2/2 lights. Central corbelled chimney.

Lot 0/2 (map 374): Vacant.

963: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays plus enclosed porch addition on east side; 1-story porch with square piers across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. 4/4 lights. 2 interior corbelled chimneys.

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Thornrose Cemetery: Established in 1849 with 12 acres on the edge of Staunton, Thornrose Cemetery now includes 65 acres, landscaped with shrubs, flowering trees, evergreens, and hardwoods to create a park-like atmosphere. The Cemetery is entered through a gate lodge on West Beverley Street and is surrounded by stone walls. The gate lodge, walls, bridge and tower, and pedestrian entry gate were designed by architect T. J. Collins ca. 1898 in the Richardsonian Romanesque style. Collins also designed many of the mausoleums. Much of the fine stonework was done by local masons Larner & Smith. Arista Hoge, president of the Thornrose Cemetery Company for many years, was instrumental in directing major improvements at the turn of the century including: The Collins structures; a large pavillion containing a life-size granite female figure called "Staunton Mourning Her Dead" (1910) sculpted by E. Barnicoat of Quincy, Mass., and four Italian marble figures (1911), two male and two female, representing the Four Seasons, overlooking the pavillion. Another significant section is the Confederate Memorial where 1500 soldiers are buried; of the 1500, only 870 are identified, the rest are unknown. Many of Staunton's well-known families are buried in Thornrose.

South side:

214 (Trinity Episcopal Church, Parish House, and Churchyard): This early Gothic Revival church was built in 1855; wings were added to enlarge the Church in 1870 under the direction of architect Edwin M. Taylor. Despite later additions and remodelings, the basic plan is of a gable roof basilica with central entrance tower. The walls are of brick laid in a variety of bonds and are encircled by a brick water table. The northern facade is dominated by the 3-stage tower flanked by the recessed nave and wings. The tower has an 8-part rose window and is crowned by battlements. The east and west sides of the building are nine bays long and have buttresses separating the lancet openings in the wings. Significant interior details include inner narthex doors ornately carved with a passion flower design and seven signed Tiffany stained glass windows. The present Church is the third on this site, the first being completed in 1763.

Parish House: Built in 1872-73, the first Parish House in Virginia. The 2-story gable roof building has 1½-story cross gable wings; walls are laid in random American bond. The 2-story gable end facade has a 3-bay, 1-story brick entrance porch with a centrally located flat end gable portal. The second story is pierced by a pointed arch window. The south walls of the wings (added in 1924 by architect T. J. Collins & Son) descend to form part of the southern retaining wall. The interior has been altered for modern use.

Rectory: See 25 Church Street.

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214 (Trinity Episcopal Church, Parish House, and Churchyard) Continued:

Churchyard: Occupies the whole block on the southwest corner of Beverley and Lewis Streets. The churchyard, which served as Staunton's burial place, features a number of family plots bound by decorative cast iron fences, table tombs, obelisks, and vertical tablets. The sloping lot contains many large shade trees and is surrounded by a brick retaining wall with a fine cast iron fence. The brick walk is laid in a basket-weave pattern. (The entire block is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and the Church is represented in the Historic American Buildings Survey.)

300-302: (The Morrison Building): Brick facing over cinderblock; 2½ stories, gable roof with 5 dormers; 11 bays on 2nd floor, 3 storefronts on 1st floor; no porch. Colonial Revival (Williamsburg style). Ca. 1935. Each storefront has own entrance (entrance to 2nd floor on east side of building). 6/6 lights. 2 endwall chimneys.

308: Brick, 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story entrance porch with bracketed μ₀ cornice and sawn millwork balusters. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1860 Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Bracketed cornice; central 2nd story window has sidelights; paired windows on side walls. 6/6 lights. 2 interior endwall chimneys.

400: (St. Paul's United Methodist Church): Permastone over pressed stone blocks; 2½ stories; complex gable roof with bell tower; 3 bays; no porch. Gothic Revival characteristics. Ca. 1905, remodeled ca. 1950. Entrance in west bay. Crenellated bell tower. Mixed lights. No chimney. Heavily remodeled ca. 1950 which destroyed original character of church. Originally built as Brethren Church.

*410: (St. Paul's Church Sunday School Building): Permastone; 2 stories with 俽 raised basement; flat roof; 8 bays; no porch. Vernacular. Ca. 1950. Entrance in 4th bay. 8-light casement windows. Does not contribute to historic character of district.

502: Frame (aluminum siding added); 2 stories; gable roof; 2 bays; 1-story entrance porch. Vernacular. Pre-1870. Entrance in west bay. 2/1 lights.

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

Central bay entrance with transom. Bargeboard with triangular design under main eaves. 6/1 and 1/1 lights. Endwall chimney.

944: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof with side gable; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with square columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1915. Entrance with transom in west bay. "Fishscale" shingles in gable end. 2/2 lights. Interior chimney.

946-952: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; complex gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story entrance porch in central bay. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. 2 entrances in central and west bays. Decorative bargeboards, vertical siding and circular motifs in gable ends. 2/2 lights.

1008: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; complex hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and around side with Tuscan columns, turned balusters, and cornice with 2 rows of dentils. Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1890. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Palladian window and "fishscale" shingles in gable end; cornice with double brackets and dentils. 6/1 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. Alterations include Colonial Revival porch added Ca. 1910.

1012: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; complex hip roof with side gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and side with spindlework and turned posts and balusters. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1890. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. "Fishscale" shingles, 3-part window, and a pendant in gable end; 2-story, 3-sided bay under gable. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.

1016: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; complex hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across 2 bays of front and around corner with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1920. Entrance in central bay. Finial on roof. 2/2 lights. Interior chimney.

1020: Frame (German siding); $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories; complex hip roof with 2 end gables facing front; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and around both sides with millwork brackets and turned balusters. Colonial Revival and Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1900. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Ornate brackets; "fishscale" shingles in gable ends. 1/1 lights. Interior corbelled chimneys.

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*1030 (Fred Henry Funeral Home): Brick, 1 story; complex hip roof; 7 bays; 1-story portico with Tuscan columns across 3 central bays. Contemporary "Colonial Revival" commercial structure. 1974. Architect: T. J. Collins and Son. Does not contribute to historic character of district. (Property includes Lots D/6,5,4,&3,map 374.)

1048: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and side with Tuscan columns; a central pediment over the entrance and dentils in the cornice. Italianate and Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1865. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Bracketed cornice. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney. Porch is probably not original but does date from before 1905.

1056: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and side with Tuscan columns. Italianate and Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1870. Central bay entrance with transom and sidelights. Bracketed cornice. 2/2 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. Porch is probably not original but does date from before 1905.

1102: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; complex hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with iron railings. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Entrance in east bay. Simple bracketed cornice. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney. Alterations include shingles and porch hardware.

1104: Frame (German siding); $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories; hip roof with hipped dormer; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1910. Entrance with transom and sidelights in east bay. 1/1 lights. Central chimney.

1108: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 1 story; gable roof; 3 bays; no porch.
Vernacular. Ca. 1895. Entrance in central bay. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.

1110: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; gable roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with iron railings. Vernacular. Ca. 1870. Entrance in central bay. 2/1 lights. 2 endwall chimneys.

Lots Shumate Addition/3&4 (map 374): Vacant. Formerly #1116, demolished Ca. 1975.

CHURCH STREET - named for Augusta Parish (now Trinity Episcopal) Church, which was located directly to the east, Church Street first appears on the plat for the Newtown addition dated 1787. The first Parish Church was built in 1763 and served briefly as the temporary "capitol" of Virginia during June 1781. (See Significance Section for details.)

studs. Stepped and battlemented gable ends. Lancet and rectangular openings, some grouped, with brick label molding and drip stones. Corbelling at cornice line. Interior chimneys with chimney pots. Part of Trinity Episcopal Church block, listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

103 (R. W. Burke House): Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with unusual spiral columns with large brackets and wrought iron balustrade. Italianate. Ca. 1865. Entrance in central bay has magnificent carved and paneled woodwork, beveled and leaded glass, all set into wide segmental arched opening. Segmental arched windows with carved lintels and decorative brick sills. Continuous double brick string courses on first and second floors form molding around window openings. 1/1 lights. Alterations include the removal of 4 tall corbelled chimneys and some of the cornice brackets. Original carriage house remains toward rear of property: Brick; 1-story; hip roof with dormer; 2 bays. Detailing similar to main house.

Lot 00/2 (map 375): Vacant.

- 111-113: Stucco; 2 stories; gable roof with gable facing front; 4 bays; (duplex of 2 bays each unit); 2-story porch across front with bungalow influence in stucco arches. Vernacular with bungalow characteristics. Ca. 1925. Two entrances in central bays. 4 vertical/l lights, some windows paired. Originally duplex, now apartments.
- 115: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with squat stuccoed columns and low wall (heavily remodeled.) Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and sidelights in north bay. Simple brackets in cornice. 1/1 lights. Central interior chimney.
- 119: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; no porch (removed). Italianate and Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1875, altered Ca. 1905. Entrance in central bay has simple frontispiece with broken pediment. Original part of house (two south bays) has 6/6 lights; later addition has 1/1 lights and a 3-part bay window on 1st floor. Interior chimneys.
- 125: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with simple pendants and brackets. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and sidelights in south bay. Brackets on main and porch cornices. 6/6 lights. Central chimney. Original 1-bay entrance porch replaced by present porch Ca. 1905.
- 127: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with square chamfered columns, simple brackets in cornice, and sawn millwork balustrade.

 Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1860. Entrance with transom in north bay.

 Bracketed cornice. 4/4 lights. Interior chimney.

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201: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front has protruding central bay flanked by grouped, fluted Ionic columns, classical entablature with dentils, and balustrade with turned posts (balustrade above porch has been removed). Italianate characteristics with Neo-Classical Revival porch. Ca. 1875, (porch Ca. 1895). Frontispiece entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Paired brackets in main cornice. Lunette window in central gable. Bay window on north wall. Architrave trim around window openings. 1/1 lights. Interior corbelled chimneys. Alterations include rear wing and present porch which replaced original 1-bay entrance porch (Ca. 1895) and bay window on north wall (added Ca. 1910).

207: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular square hipped. Ca. 1915. Entrance with transom in north bay. 3-part bay window on south bay of 1st floor. 1/1 lights.

209: Frame (tarpaper "brick" added); 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with dentils in cornice and Tuscan columns.

Vernacular. Ca. 1915. Entrance with transom and sidelights in south bay. Central gable has "fishscale" shingles and Palladian-type window. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.

211: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1865. Entrance with transom in north bay. Paired brackets in main cornice. Bay window on south wall. 4/4 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. Alterations include bay window (added Ca. 1895) and rear wing (Ca. 1925).

215: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; complex hip and gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and around south side has pendants, slender square columns with brackets, and sawn millwork balustrade. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1890. Two entrances with transoms in central bay. Simple bracketed cornice. North bay has gable with decorative shingles and bargeboard and 4-part, paneled bay window on 1st floor. Diamond-shaped window on 2nd floor of south wall. 2/2 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

219: Frame (German siding): 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with pendants, bracketed square posts, and sawn millwork balustrade. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1890. Entrance with transom in north bay. Simple bracketed cornice. 2/2 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. Large rear wing added Ca. 1900.

West side:

10: Stucco (over original brick); 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; no porch (removed) but has small brick landing and steps. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and paneled door in central bay. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney. Porch removed 1977 but house does not appear to have had one originally; the 1-story front porch was added Ca. 1895.

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16 (Formerly Methodist Parsonage): Brick; 2½ stories; gable roof with three gabled dormers; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns (grouped at entrance), pediment over entrance, dentils in cornice, and turned balusters. Colonial Revival. 1911. Entrance with fanlight in south bay. Heavy "Greek" main cornice with triglyphs and metopes. 8/1 lights. Corbelled chimneys. Architect: T. J. Collins & Son.

18: Brick; 2½ stories; complex L-gable roof with hipped dormer; 5 bays; unusual 2-story entrance porch with turned posts, brackets, and spindlework, all with Eastlake-inspired detailing. Eastlake characteristics. Ca. 1880. Entrance in central bay has sidelights and a transom flanked by consoles. Elaborate detailing includes brackets in cornices, bargeboards, and hood molds over window openings. 1/1 lights. Interior corbelled chimney. One of the most unique structures in the District.

24: Brick; 2 stories with raised basement; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across 2/3 front with delicate sawn millwork brackets and balustrade and slender, square columns. Italianate. Ca. 1860. Carved panels and brackets in main cornice. Segmental arched openings with carved wood lintels. Brick hood molds over openings. Bay window on south wall. 2/2 lights. Interior chimney.

104: Brick; 2 stories; complex hip roof; 5 bays; 1-story porch across front with ornate coupled columns, 2 rows of dentils in cornice, and turned balusters. Neo-Classical Revival characteristics. Ca. 1875, with later remodeling. Entrances in 2nd and 4th bays. Highly decorated classical cornice with dentils and modillion blocks. Central windows on both stories have sidelights. Architrave trim around all openings, with cornice-like lintels. Porch and detailing appear to be later alterations.

108: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories with raised basement; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with Ionic columns and dentils in cornice. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1890. Bracketed main cornice. 1/1 lights. Central corbelled chimney. Porch may be later addition.

118 (Judge Archibald Stuart's Law Office): Frame (clapboards and beaded siding); 1½ stories; gambrel roof with dormer; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front. Late 18th C. cottage. Ca. 1785. Entrance with paneled door in central bay. Patterned roof shingles. 9/1 lights on facade, mixed lights elsewhere. Tall endwall chimney. Small dormer with casement window in roof. This was Judge Archibald Stuart's residence and law office before Stuart House was completed. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places under Stuart House.

120 (The Stuart House): House built in two stages, and will be treated separately as Main House and South Wing. MAIN HOUSE: Brick (Flemish bond); 2 stories; gable roof with gable facing front; 5 bays; 2-story pedimented portico with Tuscan columns across front. Jeffersonian Neo-Classical. 1791. Elaborate frontispiece entrance in central bay has a paneled door flanked by fluted pilasters supporting a swan's-neck pediment. Small round vent, two 6/6 light windows and dentils in the tympanum of main pediment. Swan's-neck frontispiece entrance on north side elevation. 9/9 lights. 2 exterior chimneys. Interior features elaborate Georgian-style woodwork and mantels.

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120 (The Stuart House) Continued:

SOUTH WING: Brick (common bond); 2 stories with raised basement; hip roof; 4 bays; 1-story porch across front with brick piers at basement level and criss-cross wooden supports at main level, balustrade with V-motif railing. Vernacular. 1844. This wing was added by Judge Stuart's son Alexander H. H. Stuart. GROUNDS: Large landscaped lot of The Stuart House also includes a smoke-house (frame with hip roof) and magnificent gates with Chinese Chippendale detailing. Entire Stuart House complex (including #118) is listed in Historic American Buildings Survey, National Register of Historic Places and the Virginia Historic Landmarks Register. (See National Register nomination for further details.)

204: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; complex hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front and around side with pediment at corner, coupled Tuscan columns, and turned balusters. Italianate characteristics with Colonial Revival porch. Ca. 1860, (porch Ca. 1905). Entrance with transom and sidelights in north bay. Bracketed cornice. Paired windows with 4/4 lights on facade, 6/6 lights elsewhere.

208: Brick; 2 stories; complex hip roof; 2 bays with protruding rear wing on south; 1-story porch across front and around side with sawn millwork pendants and brackets and turned balusters. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1860. Entrance with transom and sidelights in south bay. Brackets in main cornice. 6/6 lights in facade, 4/4 lights elsewhere. Corbelled chimneys. Rear wing on south side added Ca. 1895; porch extended around side Ca. 1900.

214: Frame (German siding): 2 stories; complex hip roof; 3 bays; 2 side entrance porches, one on each side of central bay, with pendants and brackets. Italianate. Ca. 1875. Entrances located in side bays under porches. Unusual configuration of protruding central block flanked by two recessed wings. Main cornice has coupled brackets and dentils. 3-part bay window with similar cornice decoration in central bay. 2/2 lights. Corbelled chimneys. Various alterations to rear of house.

Lot AAA/4 (map 375): Vacant. Yard of #220.

220: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with sawn millwork brackets, pendants and balustrade. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1890. Entrance with transom in north bay. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney.

222: Brick; 3 stories; hip roof; 9 bays; no porch. Vernacular warehouse. Ca. 1915. -110 Entrance in 4th bay. Segmental arched openings. 1/1 lights.

* 302: Stucco; 1 story; hip roof; 2 bays; no porch. Vernacular commercial structure. Ca. 1915. Entrance in south bay. North bay is actually a drive-through to rear yard. Does not contribute to historic character of District. Various outbuildings built between 1914 and ca. 1940. None contributes to district. Originally built as Smith Fuel & Ice Co., this complex is currently wrecker service and taxi cab stand. (Property includes lots D/29 & 29A, map 408.)

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FAYETTE STREET - one of the original streets laid off in the 1787 Newtown addition and named Fayette at that time. It is possible that the street was named in honor of the Marquis de La Fayette, French hero of the American Revolution.

Dwelling built in two stages: gable roofed, 3-bay frame section on south has 9/6 lights on 2nd floor, 6/9 lights on 1st floor; hip roofed, 2 bay brick section on north has 6/6 lights. Exterior endwall chimney. Entrance remodeled Ca. 1910 by T. J. Collins & Son, architects; front porch removed at this time.
- 23-27: Concrete block "stone"! $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories; complex hip roof with 2 gables and dormer; 8 bays (originally 3 town houses); three 1-story porches (one at each end, one at center) all with Tuscan columns and dentils in cornice. Vernacular with classical detailing. Ca. 1905. 3 entrances, 1 under each end porch, 1 under center porch. Main cornice and gable ends decorated with dentils. Stone lintels over window openings. 1/1 lights. Interior chimneys.
- 117: Frame (wood shingles); 2 stories; gable roof; 5 bays; small pedimented portico over central entrance. Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1925. Entrance with fanlight and sidelights in central bay. Shed porch with Tuscan columns at each end wall. 6/6 lights. Stone endwall chimney.
- 119: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; hip roof with off-center gable;
 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with simple brackets and turned posts and small gable over entrance. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1900. Entrance with transom in central bay. 1/1 lights. Interior chimney.
- 123: Frame (aluminum siding added); 2 stories; hip roof with gable on south side; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front, with small gable over entrance, brackets and turned posts and balusters. Vernacular with Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1905. Entrance in north bay. 1/1 lights. Central chimney.

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- 125: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; gable roof with central wall dormer; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with square columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. Entrance in north bay. Bay window on south wall. 2/2 lights. Central chimney.
- 203: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns, turned balusters, and small pediment with sunburst motif over central entrance. Italianate. Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Palladian window on 2nd floor over entrance. Paired brackets in cornice. Bay window on south wall. 1/1 lights. Paired, corbelled chimneys. Alterations include bay window (added Ca. 1893), porch alteration and rear wing (Ca. 1900).

- 301: Frame (German siding); 2 stories "L"-gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch over entrance with sawn millwork brackets, turned spindles and balusters. Vernacular. Ca. 1893. Entrance in central bay. 2/2 lights. 3 interior corbelled chimneys.
- 309: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story enclosed entrance porch. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance in central bay. 4/4 lights. Central chimney.

- 315: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance in north bay. 6/6 lights. Central chimney.
- 319: Frame (asbestos shingles added); 2 stories; "L"-gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch with turned posts across 2 bays of front. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. 2/2 lights. Interior chimneys.

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321: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front has scalloped bargeboard. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance in central bay. Carved scrollwork over 2nd story windows. 4/4 lights. Exterior endwall chimnay. (This house faces south toward Lushbaugh Street, but has large rear addition facing Fayette Street.)

 Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. 6/1 lights. Interior chimney.
 House was completely remodeled Ca. 1925.
- 108: Stucco (over frame); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 2-story porch in central bay. Vernacular with Bungalow influences in porch. Ca. 1860. Paired entrances in central bay. 2/2 lights. 2 endwall corbelled chimneys. Remodeled porch and stucco appear to date from Ca. 1935.

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110: Brick; 2 stories; gable roof with shed dormer; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1925. Entrance in central bay. 1/1 lights. Endwall chimney.

114: Stucco; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Entrance in central bay. Bay window on south side. 1/1 lights. 2 interior chimneys. Alterations include addition of porch and bay window Ca. 1890.

120: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays;
1-story porch across front with Tuscan columns. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1875.
Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Central Palladian window on 2nd floor. 6/6 lights. 2 interior chimneys. Porch added Ca. 1891.

124: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance with transom in central bay. 2/2 lights Endwall chimney.

Lot LL/10 (map 375): Vacant. Backyard of #124.

128: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with sawn millwork balustrade and bracketed cornice. Italianate characteristics.

Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and sidelights in north bay. 6/6 lights. Central chimney. Porch added Ca. 1891.

208: Brick; 2 stories, raised basement; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with bracketed cornice, square columns and turned balusters. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1860. Entrance with transom in central bay. Palladian window on 2nd floor above entrance. Bracketed cornice. Tall corbelled chimneys. Part of a late 19th C. girls' school, The Staunton Female Seminary (also called Lutheran Female Institute), this was attached to #s212-214 to the south. When the school was dissolved in the late 1890's, the houses were separated and #212 appears to have been rebuilt.

212: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; hip roof with off-center gable on south; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with square columns and sawn millwork balustrade on 1st and 2nd floors. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1895. Entrance with transom in south bay. Round-headed window under gable on 2nd floor. Bracketed cornice. 6/6 lights. Interior chimney. This dwelling appears to have been completely rebuilt after the dissolution of the girls' seminary. (See #208 Fayette Street.)

214: Brick; 2 stories with raised basement; hip roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with square columns, turned balusters and bracketed cornice. Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1870. Entrance with transom and sidelights in central bay. Palladian window on 2nd floor above entrance. Bracketed cornice. 6/6 lights. Tall corbelled chimneys. This building was once part of The Staunton Female Seminary. (See #208 Fayette Street.)

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218: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; "L"-gable roof; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with pediment over entrance, millwork brackets and turned posts. Queen Anne characteristics. Ca. 1905. Entrance with transom in north bay. Shingles in gable ends. 1/1 lights.

222: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; hip roof with off-center gable; 2 bays; 1-story porch across front with simple sawn millwork balustrade. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. Entrance with transom in north bay. 2/2 lights.

224: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip and gable roof with gable facing front; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front and around side with turned balusters and simple brackets. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. Entrance with transom in south bay. 2/2 lights.

308: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof with central gable; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with turned posts. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance with transom and sidelight; in central bay. 4/4 lights. Central chimney.

312: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; porch with square piers across 2 bays of front. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance in central bay. 6/6 lights.

316: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across 2 bays of front. Vernacular. Ca. 1875. Entrance in north bay. 2/2 lights. Endwall chimney.

320: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. Entrance in central bay. 6/6 lights on sides, 2/2 on front. Central chimney.

FAYETTE COURT - This is a short cul-de-sac alley off Fayette Street, west side.

1: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; no porch, but has 2nd floor balcony. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance in rear of house. 6/6 lights.

Lot D/20 (map 408): Vacant. Formerly #3.

2: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 2 bays; 1-story entrance porch with shed roof. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance in east bay. 2/2 lights. Interior chimney.

4: Frame (German siding); 1 story with raised basement; "L"-hip roof; 4 bays; 1-story porch across ½ front. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance in north bay. 1/1 lights. 2 interior chimneys.

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FEDERAL STREET - Also one of the original streets named on the 1787 Newtown plat. Very few properties actually front on Federal Street.

North side: There are no properties that face this side of Federal Street.

South side:

Lot BBB/4 (map 375): Vacant.

12: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; gable roof; 2 bays; no porch (1-bay entrance porch removed). Vernacular. Ca. 1891. Entrance in east bay. Structure is boarded up and deteriorated.

No #: Brick; 12 stories; hip roof with large central wall dormer; 2 bays; no porch. Vernacular carriage house. Ca. 1895. 1st floor has entry door with transom on east and 3-part auto or carriage door on west. dound-headed opening in wall dormer. This originally was the carriage house for 201 Church Street. Is now vacant.

FILMORE STREET - Originally spelled "Fillmore," this street appears on an 1870 map, but had few dwellings along it until the early 20th century. It was evidently named for President Millard Fillmore, under whom local resident Alexander H. H. Stuart served as Secretary of the Interior.

East side:

(C & P Telephone Company): Brick (Flemish bond); 2 stories; flat roof with parapet wall; 7 bays; no porch. Vernacular commercial building with Colonial Revival and Neo-Classical Revival detailing. 1948-1949, with 1965 addition on north. Frontispiece entrance with semi-circular pediment and Ionic pilasters. 12/12 lights. Does not contribute to historic character of District.

201-207: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; complex gable roof; 9 bays; two 2-story porches, one at each end of building and small central entrance porch. Vernacular apartment building. Ca. 1925. Entrances in center and under each porch at sides. 4 vertical/l lights.

209: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; gable roof with gable facing front; 3 bays; -158 2-story porch across front with turned posts and balusters at both levels. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. Entrance with transom in north bay. 1/1 lights.

211-213: Frame (German siding); 2 stories; hip roof; 6 bays (duplex of 3 bays each 159 unit); 1-story porch across front with turned posts. Vernacular. Ca. 1905. 2 entrances in 2 central bays. 1/1 lights. Endwall chimneys.

215: Brick; 2 stories; gable roof; 4 bays; small gabled entrance portico. Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1925. Entrance in north bay. 1st floor openings have flat jack arches of brick with contrasting keystones. 6/6 lights. Central chimney.

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223: Frame (asbestos shingles); 1 story; gable roof with central gable over entrance; 3 bays; bracketed hood over entrance. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. Entrance in central bay. 2/2 lights.

225: Frame (asbestos shingles); 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front with sawn millwork brackets and pendants. Vernacular. Ca. 1890. Entrance in central bay. 2/2 lights. Central chimney.

Lots B/19, B/5B, B/5A, and B/5 (map 342): All vacant.

263: Frame (aluminum siding); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; no porch (removed). Vernacular. Ca. 1880. Entrance in north bay. 6/6 lights. Endwall chimney.

256: Frame (asbestos shingles); 1½ stories; gable roof with central gable over entrance; 3 bays; 1-story entrance porch. Vernacular. Ca. 1900. Entrance in central bay with transom and sidelights. 6/1 lights.

264: Frame (aluminum siding); 2 stories; "L"-gable roof; 5 bays; L-shaped, 1-story porch across front. Vernacular. Before 1877. Entrance with sidelights in central bay. 6/6 lights. 1 endwall and 1 interior chimney.

-168 270: Frame (clapboards); 2 stories; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story porch across front.
Vernacular. Ca. 1925. Entrance in central bay. 8/1 lights. Endwall chimney.

WEST FREDERICK STREET - One of Staunton's original streets, laid out in 1747-1749, Frederick Street was named after the then Prince of Wales, son of King George II and father of King George III. Frederick originally stopped at Lewis St., extended to the west as the town expanded. North side:

201 (Second Presbyterian Church): Brick, 2 stories with bell tower; gable roof; 4 bays; no porch. Gothic Revival characteristics. 1902 and partially rebuilt 1947-1948. Three pointed-arched entrances, one in each bay of main block. Corbelled cornices in main block and bell tower. Pointed-arch openings. Congregation organized 1875. Former church on site built 1876, demolished 1902 for present church. The church sustained major damage in a 1946 fire, requiring partial rebuilding and overall remodeling, completed in 1948.

*209 (Second Presbyterian Church Sunday School): Brick over concrete block; 3 stories; flat roof; 5 bays; no porch. Vernacular. 1960. Main entrance in far west bay has double doors. Corbelled cornice matches church to which this building is attached. Does not contribute to historic character of District.

211: Brick; 2 stories; hip roof; 3 bays; no porch (removed). Italianate characteristics. Ca. 1875. Frontispiece entrance in east bay (remodeled). Brick detailing includes brick quoins, triple corbelled chimney and segmental jack arches over full length 1st floor windows. Decorated wooden lintels on 2nd floor windows. 1/1 lights. Full front porch has been removed, and front entrance remodeled. This house was similar to #209 to the east (demolished in order to build new #209 above). Original manse for 2nd Presbyterian Church.

Lot D/8 (map 375): Private parking lot. (Formerly #219, a brick dwelling)

235 Stuart Hall School ("Old Main"): Brick, 2 stories; hip roof with belvedere; 5 bays; 2-story Doric portico with square, paneled columns, plain entablature, dentils in cornice. Greek Revival. 1846. Entrance in central bay has 4-panel door, transom and sidelights. Brick pilasters define bays. Facade is Flemish bond, sides American bond. Architrave trim around all window openings. 6/6 lights. 4 interior chimneys with corbelled caps (2 on each side wall). Some original interior woodwork and mantels remain. Originally established in 1844 as the Virginia Female Seminary, Stuart Hall is the oldest preparatory school for girls in Virginia. Listed on the Virginia Historic Landmarks Register and the National Register of Historic Places.

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235 (Rear Wings - all attached to rear of "Old Main", Wings are described sequentially from south to north):

- A. North Wing (includes Music Hall, Faith Hall, and Fleet and High Holborn Dormitories): Brick; 3 stories plus basement; complex hip roof with belvedere; 8 bays; no porch. Vernacular with Greek Revival characteristics. 1857 (Fleet and High Holborn), Ca. 1870 (Music Hall), Ca. 1905 (Faith Hall). Various entrances at basement level. Undecorated entablature. 6/6 lights. These additions were made over a period of time as school grew and now appear as a unit.
- Stuart Hall: Brick; 3 stories plus basement; hip roof; 5 bays; no porch. Vernacular with Greek Revival characteristics. 1898. Entrance at basement level. 6/6 lights and 4/4 lights. This building to the west of "Old Main" was named in honor of Mrs. General J. E. B. Stuart before the entire school was re-named for her in 1907.
- Whittle Hall: Brick, 4 stories plus basement; hip roof with belvedere and central pediment; 8 bays; small entrance portico in basement. Neo-Classical Revival characteristics. 1909. Main access is through other buildings but has basement entrance with portico in center of basement level. 3-story pedimented "portico" across 4 central bays of upper 3 stories has square paneled supports. Lunette in pediment. 6/6 lights.
- Arcade: Brick; 2 stories plus basement; combined gable and flat roof; 9 bays; no porch. Colonial Revival characteristics. Ca. 1933. Frontispiece entrance in central bay of basement level. Round-arched openings on upper level originally an open arcade, now glazed with multiple lights. Square-headed windows with multiple lights elsewhere. Tall decorated brick smoke-stack rises from rear center of building where physical plant is located.
- E. Academic Building: Brick; 3 stories plus basement; hip roof; 7 bays; no porch. Vernacular with Greek Revival characteristics. Ca. 1933. Frontispiece entrance in central bay with double paneled door flanked by slender Tuscan columns, and topped by decorative iron balustrade. Windows in central bay have sidelights. Three small iron balustrades on 3rd floor. 8/8 lights and 12/12 lights.

325 (Stuart Hall School--Robertson House): Brick, 2 stories with central 3% story turret; gable roof; 3 bays; 1-story entrance porch with elaborate sawn millwork. Eastlake and Queen Anne characteristics. 1886. Entrance in central bay has double paneled doors with glass panes, topped by segmental arched transom. Square central turret has narrow paired windows at 2nd and 3rd floors, leading to small balconies; corbelling decorates these window openings; on top \(\frac{1}{2} \) story is a small lunette below the roof of the turret which is cut away and decorated with a bargeboard. Other window openings also narrow, paired, with 1/1 lights. Double brackets in cornice alternate with raised panels. Eastlake-style decorative elements unusual in Staunton area. Built by Christian S. Baker in 1886 and purchased by Stuart Hall School in 1921 for use as a dormitory.

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8. Significance

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Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Newtown Historic District is a large, historically rich and architecturally varied neighborhood in Staunton whose development spans over a century and a half. On the east, where Newtown adjoins Staunton's two commercial historic districts, warehouses coexist with elegant brick homes, creating a strong visual link between the traditional downtown and the town's oldest continuously occupied residential area. Newtown's steep hills, with their fine vistas, provide a unifying element with the rest of Staunton's older areas and enhance the district's sense of identity and cohesion. Newtown has many fine buildings representative of domestic architectural styles of the 19th and early 20th centuries as well as significant individual examples of late 18th-century architecture such as the landmark Stuart House (1791). Newtown also contains several important structures that reflect Staunton's position as a flourishing religious and educational center of the 19th century. Three prominent girls' schools were located in the district, one of which survives today as Stuart Hall School. Staunton's first permanent public school building is also located in the district. The religious associations, too, are impressive, from historic Trinity Church, to the chapel of the city's first black church, organized in 1865, to the churches of several of Staunton's early congregations. Thornrose Cemetery is included due to its distinguished design elements and for the great number of prominent area residents who are buried there.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The town from its earliest period was popularly designated in its different sections by particular names. Oldtown was the oldest part, and originally embraced all the taverns, stores, and other places of business. As the town grew, it extended westward and this section, beginning where the old Episcopal church stood in the present Trinity churchyard, was known as Newtown.

In November of 1787, Alexander St. Clair deeded 25 acres of his land to the growing village of Staunton (see Map #2). This acreage, which adjoined the existing town on the west, was the earliest addition to Staunton's original 1747-49 plat (see Map #1). Streets and lots were laid off in the new section, and unlike the rest of Staunton's 18th-century core which quickly became the business district, Newtown has remained residential to this day. Thus, the Newtown Addition proper is Staunton's oldest continuously occupied neighborhood.

For the first half of the 19th century, Staunton grew quite slowly and most of the houses were built close in to the center of town. By the 1850s, Newtown was a well-populated, established neighborhood and virtually all of the district's antebellum structures are located along these streets laid off in 1787. Some of these

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early buildings include the Smith Thompson House, 701-703 West Beverley Street (Vernacular, ca. 1790); 19 Fayette Street (Vernacular with Greek Revival characteristics, ca. 1810 and 1835); the John Grove House, 26 Fayette St., Vernacular w/ Gk. Revival char, 1839); the George M. Cochran House, 606 West Johnson Street (Greek Revival, 1851); and Stuart Hall School's Cochran House (Italianate, 1858).

After the Civil War, Staunton experienced a period of unprecedented population growth and physical expansion. A huge area of Augusta County which completely surrounded the existing city was annexed in 1860. For the next four decades, Staunton's population continued to swell and housing had to be provided for this rising tide of middle— and working—class people. The previously uninhabited hills that ringed the town were destined to become these "new" neighborhoods which continued to be developed until the early 20th century. As a result, the housing in the Newtown district spans a period of about 150 years. Yet, despite this long period of growth, the entire district presents a remarkably unified appearance and has a strong sense of neighborhood cohesion. This is due to a number of contributing factors including the similarity of scale, style, and materials of the dwellings as well as the size of the city lots. The majority of buildings in the district are two-story, detached houses of frame or brick; most are built on city lots of a similar size and there are few modern "intrusions." In style, vernacular, builder—type homes or structures with simple Italianate detailing predominate, which is characteristic of the 50-year period, from 1870-1920, when they were built.

There are, however, a number of structures located throughout the district that are larger, more elaborate, and consequently, of special architectural interest. Some examples are: 9 and 11 South Madison Street, early semi-attached town houses (Italianate, ca. 1865-70); 18 Church Street (Eastlake, ca. 1880); Stuart Hall School's Robertson House (Eastlake, 1886); 234 West Frederick Street (Queen Anne and Chateauesque, ca. 1895); 220 West Frederick Street (Queen Anne and Chateauesque, ca. 1898, architect T. J. Collins); 16 Church Street (Colonial Revival, 1911, architect T.J. Collins & Son); and 928 West Beverley Street (Bungalow, ca. 1915).

Thus, a century and a half of domestic building styles, from 1780 to 1930, are represented in the district, giving it enormous architectural significance as an outstanding example of organic neighborhood growth.

The Newtown Historic District is perhaps best known for three properties already listed in the National Register: Trinity Episcopal Church, "Old Main" of Stuart Hall School, and the venerable Stuart House on Church Street. All three give the district special historic significance.4 Trinity's first building was the original Augusta Parish Church which served as the only house of worship in Staunton in the early years, as well as the repository for the parish records. This early building also served for a few brief days as the capitol of Virginia during the waning days of the American Revolution.5 The present Gothic Revival structure is the third church on the site. The Stuart House, built in 1791 for Judge Archibald Stuart, is one of the area's oldest documented buildings and one of the city's outstanding landmarks. Its design was influenced by Stuart's friend, Thomas Jefferson, and it is probably the state's first porticoed, temple-form house. Stuart Hall's "Old Main" is a fine example of Greek Revival institutional architecture. It was built in 1846 to house the girls' school known then as the Virginia Female Institute which was the

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first preparatory school for girls in the state.

The importance of Newtown as a regional education center during the 19th century should be emphasized. In addition to Stuart Hall, the district contained two other prominent female seminaries, a distinguished business college, and the first permanent public school building in Staunton. The Wesleyan Female Institute was located in the two buildings at 606 and 610 West Johnson Street on the square known as Madison Place. Begun by the Methodists in 1846, WFI first held classes in the basement of the old church on Lewis Street and in the 1850s built a school building on West Beverley Street where the Methodist Church parking lot is today. By 1870, their need for a larger facility resulted in their purchase of the George M. Cochran House and three surrounding acres upon which a new building was erected and the plant expanded. By the late 1890s, it was clear that the school was in financial trouble, and the property was sold in 1900 to a private buyer.

The other school for girls, the Staunton Female Seminary, was run by Lutherans and was located in the buildings at 208 and 214 Fayette Street. It is not clear when the school was founded, although it certainly was located in these buildings in 1877. It appears to have closed by 1896 when the grounds were purchased by another important educational institution, the Dunsmore Business College.

The Dunsmore Business College served Staunton for almost a century. It was founded by Professor J. G. Dunsmore in 1872 and moved to Staunton in 1884. For some years, it was located in a downtown building and was then moved to Fayette Street. In 1901, Professor Dunsmore commissioned architect T. J. Collins to build a new school at 912 West Beverley Street to meet the college's expanding needs. Until it closed in the early 1970's, the Dunsmore Business College had a fine reputation for training both men and women in the skills of the business world. The West Beverley Street building is now used as the Valley Rescue Mission.

Last, the Stonewall Jackson School at 217-219 West Beverley Street was built ca. 1888 as Staunton's first permanent school building for white children. Prior to its completion, school was held in various locations, including the basements of churches or in private homes. Several generations of Stauntonians attended the Stonewall Jackson School until the building was closed in 1975. In 1912, Woodrow Wilson, president-elect and favorite son of Staunton, reviewed a parade in his honor from in front of the school. The building was completely remodeled in the Tudor Revival style by architects T. J. Collins & Son in 1913. It was recently renovated and converted to commercial use.

It is often noted that Staunton is a city of churches, and eight are located in the Newtown Historic District alone. Although Trinity Episcopal is, of course, the oldest and most historic of all the city's congregations, there are others of note. The Allen Chapel of the African Methodist Episcopal Church is located on West Beverley Street. Its congregation, reportedly the oldest black church in Staunton, was organized in 1865. The church building, too, appears to date from 1865, although it has been extensively altered in this century. Other churches of interest in the district include Second Presbyterian, organized in 1875 (the present church building dates from 1902, with alterations in 1948), Central United Methodist Church, organized in 1797 (present church 1893 and 1915), and Emmanuel Episcopal Church, organized 1893 (present church built 1894, altered 1902).

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The magnificent grounds of Thornrose Cemetery make up a large part of the Newtown Historic District. Thornrose is included because of its visual relationship to the rest of the district, for the excellence of its design elements, and for the important Stauntonians who are buried there. Begun on twelve acres in 1849-50. Thornrose has since grown to over five times its original size.6 It is surrounded on all four sides by residential areas and visually is very much a part of the streetscape of Newtown. This is particularly apparent along the 1000 and 1100 blocks of West Beverley Street where, beyond the stone walls and gate lodge entranceway, the meticulously maintained open spaces of the cemetery with its hundreds of flowering trees and shrubs are clearly seen. The gate lodge, exterior walls, bridge, and vaults are the work of architect T. J. Collins. All are characterized by the excellence of the stonework and by such design elements as bronze doors, stained-glass windows, and wrought-iron grilles. The cemetery also boasts some notable statuary including marble figures of the Four Seasons and a life-size female figure in granite called "Staunton Mourning Her Dead" which is located in a columned pavilion. Much of the embellishment of Thornrose was directly attributable to Arista Hoge who served as the President of the Thornrose Cemetery Company for many years around the turn of the century. 7 Most prominent Staunton residents were interred here and, indeed, still are. There is a large section set aside to commemorate the Confederate soldiers. Of the more than 1500 soldiers buried here, only 870 are identified according to name, rank and regiment. Of the others, not even their names are known.

One of the chief reasons for building so close to town was the difficulty of obtaining water. Historian Joseph A. Waddell describes Staunton during the years 1833-34: "The people of Staunton obtained water for drinking and cooking from a half dozen public wells, and the labor of carrying water to distant points no doubt retarded the growth of the town. There were few houses on the hills." However, Waddell informs us that by 1848, water in adequate supply was being piped into town from springs in the surrounding county and that "dwellings soon sprang up on the hills surrounding the town." Both references are from Waddell's Annals of Augusta County, Virginia, pp. 421 and 436.

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Footnotes to Section 8 (continued):

An interesting description of Thornrose in the early days comes from J. Lewis Peyton's History of Augusta County, Virginia, written in 1872, on page 5: "To within a comparatively recent period, the grave-yard of the Episcopal Church in Staunton was used for the interment of all persons dying in or near the city. Its overcrowded condition...led to the purchase of twelve acres of land beyond the town limits in 1850, and the laying out of that beautiful City of the Dead, known as Thornrose Cemetery... In the absence of a park, garden, or other decorative public ground in or near Staunton, Thornrose is a favorite resort..."

Arista Hoge's Staunton residence was listed in the National Register July 1982.

The boundaries of the Newtown Historic District are justified as follows (as in verbal boundary description, start at southwest corner of Middlebrook Avenue and South Lewis Street):

To the south of Middlebrook Avenue are the C & O Railroad tracks; to the west of South Jefferson Street is another neighborhood quite distinct in character from Newtown; along the south side of West Beverley Street the structures conform in style and period to the rest of the district and are visually linked to Thornrose Cemetery; to the northwest, the boundary follows the property lines of Thornrose Cemetery and Reservoir Hill Park; to the northeast of the park are structures which, although they are not of the first calibre, are linked topographically, visually, and developmentally to the remainder of Newtown (above this northern boundary is largely new development); the turn-of-the-century residences along the North Lewis Street corridor from Churchville Avenue south to Frederick Street provide visual continuity and divide the neighborhood on the west from the recent commercial development on the east; the southern part of Lewis Street where it adjoins the existing Beverley Historic District is a transitional area of older commercial structures that is strongly linked both visually and historically to the traditional business district to the east and to the railway property to the south.
