

Map 1. The Iroquoian territory of the Nottoway, Meherrin, and Tuscarora (Binford 1967). Tribal names are in all capital letters.







Figure 1. The signature page of the 1677 Articles of Peace, or Treaty of Middle Plantation, signed by the Nottoway in Williamsburg. Aside from the Pamunkey signatories, the Nansmond, Nottoway, and Weyanock tribes all lived on the south side of the James River, and eventually coalesced as one community on the Nottoway's Southampton County reservation.




Map 2. The Circle and Square Tract Nottoway Reservations.



Map 3. The remaining Nottoway lands, c.1830. Circle areas are settlements of the matrilineages.




Map 4. 1864 Map detail of Southampton County, prominently showing the remaining “Indian Land” west of Jerusalem, later known as Courtland.



Map 5. 1847-1871 Nottoway reservation allotments; Millie Woodson Turner’s allotment is near center (marked with arrow).





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


