DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Oakridge is a rolling tract of farmland situated near Blackstone in Nottoway County. The dwelling house, the only old structure on the property, is an early nineteenth-century frame structure consisting of a two-story, three-bay western section and a story-and-a-half, one-bay east wing, set back from either facade. The first-floor windows have nine-over-nine sash, and the second-floor windows have nine-over-six sash. Modern louvred blinds embellish the windows of the present (south) front. At the east end is a small lean-to, with an ell projecting from the rear of it; these twentieth-century additions accommodate a kitchen and a dining room. The original sections are clad with molded weatherboards (except · for the south side of the east wing, which has beaded weatherboards) while plain weatherboards are used on the modern sections. A modillion cornice embellishes the eaves of the gable roofs which are covered with standing-seam sheet metal, and there is a single shed dormer with six-over-six sash built against the west block wall on the south slope of the east wing roof. The house is set on a Flemish-bond brick underpinning, and there are exterior Flemish-bond brick chimneys at either end; that on the west has small tiled weatherings. Distyle gable-roofed twentieth-century porches shelter the front and rear entrances.

The plan of Oakridge is a common one in early nineteenth-century houses in the region. The main block has a side-passage plan with a single large room to the west, and there is a single room in the east wing. The closed-string, Chinese Chippendale stair is located in the passage. It has a square newel, molded banister, no spandrel, and a recessed-panel soffit. Under it a railing with plain square balusters marks the former location of a stair to the basement now replaced by a trap door. Recessed-panel wainscoting is carried around the passage.

The west (bed) room was probably the original parlor. It has recessed-panel wainscoting, a punch-and-dentil cornice, and a full-height chimney breast. The latter consists of an architrave surround and a frieze consisting of two adjacent rectangular recessed panels. A molded, unsupported shelf separates these from two more tiers of recessed panels—a single large one below two smaller adjacent ones. The whole is flanked by a pair of fluted Roman Doric pilasters with plain, high bases and plain entablature blocks.

The east (living) room, formerly either a dining room or a chamber, is decorated very similarly to the west room. However, it lacks the cornice carried around the room and for the two tiers of panels above the mantel shelf on the chimney breast are substituted three diminishing tiers of two adjacent recessed panels each.

Many original six-panel, raised-panel doors hung on HL hinges survive throughout the house, as do several iron box locks with brass knobs.

Justification of Acreage

The boundaries containing the 60-acre Oakridge tract enclose a natural geographic area composed of a ridge of open land surrounded, for the most part, by the tree-line. The setting, on the ridge, is a suitable one for this Early Republican plantation dwelling.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The handsome frame dwelling house at Oakridge, a rolling tract of farmland in Nottoway County, is a fine example of the residence of a prosperous Early Republican planter in Southside Piedmont Virginia. Built late in the eighteenth or early in the nineteenth century by Burwell Smith, the house is handsomely decorated and is particularly noteworthy for its handsome stair in the Chinese Chippendale taste. Chinese lattice stair railings are rare in Virginia; most of the surviving ones are in post-Colonial Southside houses. The Oakridge example is a simplified but effective version of the form; its particular pattern has not been observed elsewhere.

Smith (d. 1828) began acquiring land on Whetstone Creek and the Little Nottoway River in 1793 and continued to add to his holdings until 1823. There were already buildings on the land at the first recording of structures in the land tax books in 1820 (at which time Smith owned holdings of 3168½ and 232 acres). Since the value of the buildings remained unchanged throughout the remainder of Smith's life, it is evident that the present house was standing by 1820. In fact, architectural evidence supports the traditional date -1800-although it is not specifically documented. Smith was a colorful and perhaps a prototypical planter of the Southside tobacco belt, having been described by one writer as "a particularly parsimonious and illiterate man, but / one who/accumulated much property."

From Burwell Smith the property passed to his wife and then in 1830 to his son, Kennon Smith. Kennon Smith's widow, Mary, transferred Oakridge, which she had inherited in 1838, to her second husband, Warner Wortham Guy, in 1843. It descended to Guy's son, William Scott Guy, sometime after 1860. Mrs. George H. Walker is the current owner.
