The property contains the main church building and a small storage shed in the rear of the property. The church's primary use currently is a house of worship but in the past it has also been a school. The church is prominently featured at the front of the property facing the main road. It is white with a gray pitched roof. The front is a two-tiered bell tower with a Mansard style roof capped with a steep spire and features sawtooth shingles on the sides. The main sanctuary building has vinyl siding (added later ) and along the roofline a swag serpentine ribbon design. This same swag motif is also found along the window molding above the stained glass windows and the transom top molding at the front entrance. The interior walls are done in plaster and beadboard wainscotting. There is a wooden floor with carpeted walkways and stairs. The balcony railings and support columns are darkly stained and varnished in a high gloss. The ceilings also feature beadboard cut at a 45 degree angle and laid in between thick wide planks of decorative trim. Overall the physical appearance is good, however some attention needs to be paid to the front entrance shingles and plaster walls.


Union Zion Baptist Church is the sister church to the first black church established in Gloucester County – Zion Poplars Baptist Church (located in the National Register). It was built just after the Civil War ended when many blacks in the neighborhood desired not only their *own* place of worship but also a closer place of worship instead of walking through marshy conditions and taking boats to the mother church. Its designer and builder Charles Evans was a member of the congregation and a recent graduate of architecture at Hampton Institute (now Hampton University). He envisioned a church designed with the latest architectural details of the Victorian period. Mr. Evans would go on to become an instructor at the Tuskegee Institute and work with Booker T. Washington. Another notable congregant is Daniel T. Gardner, a founding member but also a Medal of Honor winner during a Civil War Battle.



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







