The Petersville Church School is located in the Petersville Community in the magisteria			

The Petersville Church School is located in the Petersville Community in the magisteria area of Marshall District in New Canton (Buckingham County), Virginia. When traveling on State Route 613, also known as Petersville Church Road, the traveler will notice the on the right side. Adjacent to the church on the left side, is a playground for children of the church and the community. Paralleled to the church on the right is the cemeter The property of the church consists of oak, poplar, cedar, and pine trees. The grounds of the church and cemetery are covered in grass, and the parking lot is paved.

4. Property's History and Significance (Please do not exceed one page)

The Petersville Schoolhouse is a significant part of Petersville Baptist Church and the Petersville Community because it was the first school constructed for children of ex-slaves - many of which have descendants residing in the community and attending the church to this day. The church was organized in 1871 by Norris Hobson, Isaac Fleming, Norris Hartwell, Jesse Scruggs, and Betty Thomas. According to our church history, Norris Hobson's grandfather purchased 17.5 acres from a Mr. J. P. Wilson, and the church was built in 1871. The first elected pastor of the church was Rev. Benjamin W. Hartwell. He and his wife, Niecy, are buried in the cemetery. See Attachment 2. There are many of their descendants still residing in the Petersville Community and members of the church.

By 1870, there were small log buildings with earthen floors built as black schools in all areas of Buckingham County. Therefore, it is assumed that the schoolhouse was built sometime after the building of the church. The last known schoolteacher who taught at the school was Mrs. Annie Jackson. See Attachment 3 is a photo of Mrs. Jackson and students taken inside of the school, and a photo taken during a social event. Mrs. Jackson and her husband, Arthur Jackson, are buried in the cemetery. See Attachment 4. Many of the students are deceased, but there are a few of students residing in the community and members of the church.

In addition to being a school, the building was used for meetings, social and community activities, such as parties, dinner sales to help purchase items for the church, Easter Egg hunts, and to show movies from old projectors. See a copy of minutes from 1943 and 1952 as Attachment 5.

Surnames of community people, such as Anderson, Blaine, Booker, Brown, Carter, Fleming, Foster, Hartwell, Hatcher, Henderson, Liggins, Mayo, Taylor, and Woodson made up the Petersville Community as far back to 1830 based on graves in the cemetery. Many of the descendants reside in the community and are members of the church.

Dr. Carter G. Woodson is the father of Black History. His homeplace is approximately 15 to 20 minutes from the Petersville Baptist Church and community. He has descendants still residing in the Community and surrounding communities that are members of the church. You will find many headstones and markers in the cemetery who are descendants of Dr. Woodson.



Since I am not able to scan the above-referenced document, I am providing the following that I had included in the form:

School

Segregation of schools began in 1870, just five (5) years after the end of slavery. The Petersvill School is a vernacular styled, one-story, one-room building that is rectangular in shape, and it has weatherboard siding. There is only a front entrance to the school and the building has a window in the front, back, and left side of the building. The roof is tin. The interior of the school has its original wooden floor. What appears to be the original chimney is still in place. The school has a combination of both shiplap and sheetrock walls. The school is currently used as a shed, but it is evident that the building was once used as a school and social meeting place for the church and the Petersville Community. See Attachment 1.

Church

In 1871, the land was purchased, and a log cabin was built as a place of worship for newly freed slaves. Laer as membership grew, a new structure had to be built. In 1938, the building was crushed with ice and snow. Some faithful members, through hard labor and the will of God, were able to reerect the building so worship services could resume in the spring. In September 1972, physical improvements were made to the church by adding bathrooms, a choir room, and a pastor's study. In 1982, the church underwent more physical renovations, such as the purchase of new pews,new carpet, a public announcement system, ceiling fans, air conditioning, new tables for the outdoor dining area, a new front door entrance, and new steps with a handicap ramp.

A fellowship hall, which included a kitchen and baptismal pool, was constructed to the south wing of the church in 1991. In August 1998, the walls that contained the foundation of over a century of spiritual history came tumbling down when the start of a new church construction was being built to the existing fellowship hall. The first worship service in our new church was held in July 1999.

The members of the church, along with donations, allowed further expansion of the church when an addition to the church and fellowship hall was built and named the Nehemiah House in 2013. This addition has a vaulted ceiling, a commercial style kitchen, a stage, and separate bathrooms for males and females. The Nehemiah House has the capacity to hold approximately 230 people, with an entrance facing the south of the building. This building is the formal dining room of the church. It is also used for conferences, larger birthday parties, wedding receptions, repasses, homecoming dinners, and other social events. Entrance to Nehemiah House can also be entered through the fellowship hall.

In 2023, the fellowship hall was renovated and renamed the Agape Center, where church school and smaller social events are held.

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Rev. Dr. Jessie M. Woodson-Johnson, D.Min. John 4:29 Petersville School – J. McKnight notes (Additional Description for PIF)

School

The Petersville School is a vernacular one-story, one-room building that is rectangular in shape with weatherboard siding and a hipped metal roof. There is only a front entrance to the school and the building has paired wood windows in the front, back, and on the left side of the building.

The interior of the school has its original wooden flooring. What appears to be the original chimney stack is intact. Sheetrock covers the walls and ceilings, but original beadboard remains intact at the ceiling level. The PIF states that "shiplap" remains intact along some wall areas.

The school is currently used as a shed, but it is evident that the building was once used as a school and social meeting place for the church and the Petersville Community.

Cemetery

There is a sizeable cemetery with approximately 200 marked burials adjacent to the church building. Burials range in date – with the earliest appearing to be 1910, but many markers are undated, thus could be older. Markers range in form, material, and type.
