State Review Board (SRB)

Chair Mullen called the State Review Board to order at 9:59 a.m.

Deputy Director Williams called roll to confirm the presence of a quorum for the SRB. Chair Mullen, Vice Chair Allen, Dr. Breen, Ms. Shull, Dr. Smith, and Mr. Rutledge are present.

Chair Mullen read the land acknowledgement statement. He then explained the purpose and duties of the SRB and the process of Register designation. Each SRB member introduced themselves.

Chair Mullen noted that today's meeting is taking place in person and online, and that it is being recorded. He said that some members of the public are attending the meeting online.

Chair Mullen next asked the SRB members if there were any questions about the agenda. Hearing none, Chair Mullen requested a motion to approve the meeting format and agenda. Dr. Smith so moved, and Dr. Allen seconded. The Board members voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Chair Mullen asked for a motion to approve the December 11, 2025, meeting minutes. Dr. Breen so moved, and Ms. Shull seconded. The Board members voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Board of Historic Resources (BHR)

Vice Chair Jorjani called the Board of Historic Resources to order at 10:08 a.m.

Deputy Director Williams called roll to establish the presence of a quorum for the BHR. Vice Chair Jorjani, Dr. Spivey, Mr. Townes, Ms. Hutson, Mr. Bosket, and Mr. Hartley are present.

Vice Chair Jorjani explained the purpose and duties of the BHR. She invited BHR members to introduce themselves and introduced herself.

Vice Chair Jorjani noted that today's meeting is taking place in person and online and is being recorded. She said that some DHR staff members are attending the meeting online as are members of the public.

Vice Chair Jorjani requested a motion for approval of the meeting format and agenda. Ms. Hutson so moved, and Dr. Spivey seconded. The Board members voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Vice Chair Jorjani asked for a motion to approve the December 11, 2025, meeting minutes. Mr. Bosket so moved, and Ms. Hutson seconded. The Board members voted unanimously in the affirmative.

Chair Mullen then gave the floor to Director Kirchen.

Director's Report

Director Kirchen began his report by thanking Mr. Bosket and the Virginia Museum of History and Culture for hosting today's meeting. He recommended that board members and those in attendance take a moment to view the maquette of the Barbara Rose Johns statue for the National Statuary Hall at the United States Capitol, which is currently on display at the museum, and remarked on the great success of the statue's recent dedication. He also noted upcoming programming at the museum surrounding the 75th anniversary of the walk-out at Robert R. Moton High School in Farmville, led by Johns, as well as the upcoming opening of the museum's We The People exhibit.

Director Kirchen next introduced Mr. Andrew Tarne, in attendance from the Office of the Attorney General. He also welcomed Lewis Longenecker and his class from Cumberland Middle School and thanked them for their attendance and contributions to the proposed historical highway marker for the Robert R. Moton Rosenwald School. He congratulated Dr. Breen, Dr. Smith, and Mr. Rutledge on their recent reappointments to the SRB, and reminded board members of recent digital training modules prepared by agency staff and shared with them.

Next, Director Kirchen introduced DHR's new Deputy Director, Elizabeth Tune, who returns to the agency from the National Park Service after previously serving as Director of Preservation Incentives. He reminded the board members of the appointment of former delegate David L. Bulova as Secretary of Natural and Historic Resources, noting his familiarity with DHR's work. He also informed the boards of DHR's recent work on Governor Spanberger's Executive Orders #1 and #3, which are aimed at cutting costs in state government and increasing

housing affordability and supply, respectively. DHR has submitted ideas on how the agency can effectively address both initiatives.

Turning to agency updates, Director Kirchen informed the boards that the recently approved federal spending package included level funding for the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), though DHR is still awaiting notice to be able to draw down those funds. He noted the February announcement of a new program for highway markers commemorating lynching sites across the Commonwealth, with current funding allowing for approximately 15 new markers. These new markers will follow the same process of BHR approval.

Director Kirchen went on to note that the pre-application process is now open for the third round of DHR's Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) Historic Preservation Program. He also informed the boards that the agency has been awarded an NPS Underrepresented Communities Grant to survey historic resources associated with Asian American and Pacific Islander communities across Virginia. The project aims to produce 75 historic resource surveys as well as a National Register nomination for Eden Center in Falls Church.

Director Kirchen informed the boards that upgrades to DHR's collections storage are nearly complete, with 4,400 square feet of compact storage added, and reminded them that the agency's archaeological collections remain closed to the public while staff conduct a systematic review pursuant to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA).

Director Kirchen then offered a brief update on the recently adjourned General Assembly session. He noted that two new full-time positions for DHR's easements program remain in the proposed budget, though other bills involving the agency failed in committee. This includes legislation that would have authorized the acquisition of James Monroe's Oak Hill property in Loudoun County for conversion into a state park.

Director Kirchen concluded his report by expressing his honor at being the first archaeologist to serve as DHR's Director as well as his optimism for the agency's future.

Public Comment

Vice Chair Jorjani introduced and explained the purpose of the public comment period and noted that speakers are asked to limit their remarks to three minutes. She added that the BHR will not take action on any comments presented today but DHR will take the comments under consideration. She requested that speakers limit their comments to a span of three minutes. She added that a second comment period will occur when the BHR meets this afternoon to review Highway Marker and Easement program materials.

Seven people signed in to speak in person. No one attending virtually registered to speak:

1. Jack Owens from the Shenandoah Valley Battlefields Foundation spoke in support of the highway marker for The Lynching of William Shorter. Mr. Owens leads the foundation's Long Road to Freedom Project, which sponsored the marker. He also passed along the support of Byron C. Smith, Director of the Newtown History Center in Stephens City.
2. Haley Greene, a 7th grade student at Cumberland Middle School, spoke in support of the highway marker for Robert R. Moton (Rosenwald) School and shared additional historic context.
3. Sophia Perez, a 7th grade student at Cumberland Middle School, spoke in support of the highway marker for Robert R. Moton (Rosenwald) School and shared additional historic context.
4. Alexa Thurston, a 7th grade student at Cumberland Middle School, spoke in support of the highway marker for Robert R. Moton (Rosenwald) School and shared additional historic context.
5. Steven Payne, owner of the Saunders House in Warrenton, spoke in support of the property's nomination for register listing and thanked Aubrey Von Lindern and author Dan Pezzoni for their contributions.
6. Todd Kilduff, Deputy County Administrator for Hanover County, spoke in support of the nomination for Henry Clay Elementary School. He informed the Boards that the building will be repurposed for housing following extensive community outreach conducted by the County, and he thanked Faye Prichard, Hanover County Board of Supervisors member for the Ashland District, for her advocacy during the process.

7. Casey Stallworth spoke in support of the highway marker for Clarence Smith, noting Mr. Smith's formative impact on his own life and community.

Vice Chair Jorjani thanked everyone who spoke today, noted that their comments will receive careful consideration, and said that the public comment period is concluded.

Vice Chair Jorjani called for a brief break at 10:42 a.m. The meeting resumed at 10:50 a.m.

CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chair Jorjani called the meeting to order at 12:46 p.m.

Vice Chair Jorjani read the Board of Historic Resources Call to Order of those members present: Mr. Bosket, Mr. Hartley, Ms. Hutson, Dr. Spivey, Mr. Townes and Chair Rutherford.

Vice Chair Jorjani read the following Land Acknowledgement Statement:

The Department of Historic Resources, the Board of Historic Resources, and the State Review Board acknowledge the indigenous peoples of Virginia and express its gratitude for their continued stewardship of her lands and waterways over many generations. We also acknowledge the free and enslaved Africans and their descendants whose labors and contributions on behalf of the Commonwealth have long been overlooked. We commit ourselves to meaningful engagement with all Virginians, past and present, as we strive to fulfill our charge as stewards of Virginia's long and rich history.

Vice Chair Jorjani read the following BHR Purpose Statement:

The Virginia Board of Historic Resources is an official policy-making board of the Commonwealth of Virginia created by the Code of Virginia. Its policies are implemented by the Department of Historic Resources, which day in and day out labors on behalf of our irreplaceable resources in the interest of the citizens of this Commonwealth. The Board is charged primarily with the responsibility for:

1. *Designating historic landmarks of local, statewide, or national significance;*
2. *Establishing historic preservation practices for the care and management of our Virginia Historic Landmarks;*
3. *Designating state-recognized historic districts and archaeological sites and zones;*
4. *Approving historical highway markers;*
5. *Reviewing programs and services of the Agency, and making recommendations to the Director of DHR and the Governor regarding programs and services; and in order to preserve important sites and buildings in perpetuity; and*
6. *Accepting voluntarily granted gifts of preservation easements over historic properties to the Commonwealth.*

The Governor of Virginia selects members of the Board from volunteer and professional leaders of Virginia's history, preservation, and museum communities. Votes taken during this meeting are official actions of the Commonwealth of Virginia Board of Historic Resources.

New Easement Offers for Consideration

Board Comments Summary:

An explanation of the Virginia Land Conservation Foundation was also requested and provided. Members encouraged the continued dialogue regarding protection of the remaining acreage.

2. Final review of the title work, title commitment, survey, draft easement and other recorded and unrecorded documents affecting title to the property by the Office of the Attorney General. Per this review, counsel may identify additional issues that require documentation or action.

3. Glass Tract, First Kernstown Battlefield, Frederick County

Easement Applicant: Shenandoah Valley Battlefield Foundation

Offer for ±127.273 acres

Grant Funding: American Battlefield Protection Program, Virginia Battlefields Preservation Fund

The Easement Acceptance Committee recommends acceptance of the Glass Tract easement offer subject to the following conditions:

1. Demolition of the existing non-historic buildings and structures and rehabilitation of the landscape completed within three years from the date of easement recordation. Rehabilitation or restoration of the landscape shall be conducted according to a written rehabilitation plan management plan negotiation by DHR and SVBF, and such plan shall be incorporated in the easement by reference.
2. SVBF must provide perpetual, direct and dedicated access for DHR staff and the general public to the western parcel either as a pull-off located along Jones Road or another direct route.
3. Final review of the title work, title commitment, survey, draft easement and other recorded and unrecorded documents affecting title to the property by the Office of the Attorney General. Per this review, counsel may identify additional issues that require documentation or action.

4. Kaylor Tract, Port Republic Battlefield, Rockingham County

Easement Applicant: Shenandoah Valley Battlefield Foundation

Offer for ±169.891 acres

Grant Funding: American Battlefield Protection Program, Virginia Battlefields Preservation Fund

The Easement Acceptance Committee recommends acceptance of the Kaylor Tract easement offer subject to the following conditions:

1. Agreement on a maximum collective footprint of 0.75% of the total acreage of the easement, including permitted new improvements, existing non-historic resources, and existing historic resources. Easement staff will continue to work with the Kaylor Family to clarify details of this cap.
2. Final review of the title work, title commitment, survey, draft easement and other recorded and unrecorded documents affecting title to the property by the Office of the Attorney General. Per this review, counsel may identify additional issues that require documentation or action.

Eastern Regionpresented by Joanna McKnight and Ari Calos

1. Dutch Gap Canal, Chesterfield and Henrico Counties, DHR File No. 020-6465 Δ
Board members and DHR staff discussed potential approaches for successfully nominating the property under African American Ethnic Heritage, given previous nomination returns for this area of significance. The Blue Ridge Tunnel in Nelson County (DHR ID 062-5105; VLR 2022, NRHP 2023) was noted as a comparable resource. The possibility of framing Ethnic Heritage through the lens of Labor History was discussed. The board concurred with the staff evaluation committee's recommendations regarding eligibility.
2. Masonic Home of Virginia, Henrico County, DHR File No. 043-7166
Ms. Shull noted that since the property is being recommended eligible under Criterion A, the period of significance can extend beyond the date of construction for the chapel (1949) to encompass relevant history. The property's transition from a children's home to a retirement facility was suggested as a possible end date. Regarding the potential for statewide significance, board members noted that a future nomination should discuss the specific need or gap that this property addressed relative to other similar services across the Commonwealth. The board concurred with the staff evaluation committee's recommendations regarding eligibility.

Northern Regionpresented by Aubrey Von Lindern

Ms. Shull asked for clarification on the level of restoration undertaken on the house following fire damage, expressing concern that it may represent more of a reconstruction (Criteria Consideration E). Ms. Von Lindern noted that DHR's evaluation committee previously deferred an eligibility recommendation in 1993 for this reason but stated that she felt more confident based on her own site visit and documentation that is now available. Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) documentation that was used in the house's restoration was displayed for board members and staff. Dr. Breen recommended that a potential nomination should address the context of enslavement on the property, given the surviving kitchen (with loft space) and other outbuildings. The board concurred with the staff evaluation committee's recommendations regarding eligibility.
